### **FACT BOX**

On September 9, 2021, President Biden <u>announced</u> a <u>federally-imposed</u> <u>vaccine mandate</u> for over 80 million private sector and federal American workers. Employers with 100+ workers must require vaccination or weekly tests. <u>OSHA</u> can <u>fine private businesses</u> \$14,000 per accidental violation or upwards of \$140,000 per wilful violation (fine per worker).

- On December 4, 2020, Biden <u>said</u>, "No, I don't think it should be mandatory. I wouldn't demand it to be mandatory." In July 27, 2021, <u>Press Secretary Jen Psaki said</u>, "Can we mandate vaccines across the country? No, that's not a role that the federal government, I think, even has the power to make."
- As of <u>September 11, 2021</u>, there have been 41.7 million COVID cases in the US, with 31.8 million recoveries. An <u>Israeli study</u> found that natural immunity from COVID recorveries offer longer-lasting defense to viruses than vaccinated immunity.
- Over half of the US population has been fully vaccinated as of September 10, 2021, with 62.9% having at least one dose. <u>Johns Hopkins research</u> shows COVID spikes are rising threefold despite half the country being fully vaccinated.
- An August <u>AP-NORC poll</u> found 55% of Americans support requiring vaccination for government workers, while 21% oppose it.
- A <u>CNN poll</u> released Friday found that <u>69% of Americans</u> say the country is "going badly" compared to the 77% rating in January before President Biden took office. Biden's current approval rating is 52% with 48% disapproval.
