Science Olympiad is a nationally-recognized, non-profit program that provides children in grades K-12 with hands-on learning activities designed to spark the imagination and illuminate the world of science. This will be the 13th Science Olympiad at Lincoln! Teams of up to five students will experience three fun and exciting 20-minute events.

The event will be run by our PTA committee, parent volunteers, and high school student volunteers. Children should arrive at the school between 6:20 and 6:30 PM on the night of the Olympiad. At that time, they will receive a name tag and be placed in small groups of 3 to 5 students that will rotate through three 20-minute science demonstrations together. Each small group will have a parent guide who helps them complete the demonstrations and guides them as they rotate to events in different rooms. The events are non-competitive – the emphasis is on exploring science concepts together and having fun.
