PURPOSE:

Research to Build and Present Knowledge

INQUIRY QUESTION

What *meanings* did the Greek myths have for the ancient Greeks?

Explore a thematic topic in Greek mythology (e.g., generosity, narcissism, altruism, honesty, arrogance, justice, deceit, treachery, hospitality, etc.) and explain its significance.

Directions:

- 1. Read **sources** about **4 or more DIFFERENT** myths/mythological figures. You may use print books and/or digital sources provided here:
 - a. eBooks in Destiny Discover (access through Clever) OPEN the books; do NOT check them out.
 - b. ProQuest eBook Central (username = clovisusd; pw = M8wzPWIT)
 - c. PowerSearch (library database; pw = broncos)

TIPS:

- i. Type (Mythological figure) after your character's name when you search.
- ii. Click on **Books** for your source type.
- 2. As you read, record your *thinking* in the table below. Be prepared to *share* your ideas with a small group.

A good research question is open-ended. It:

> Has multiple possible answers

> Requires reading and thinking

> Is complex, not simple

Your research question should: include a thematic topic include a connection to Greek mythology provoke discussion of meaning around the theme topic Your question should <i>NOT lead to a retelling of the myth</i> (summarizing what happened). Your answer to your question will be your THESIS statement - a BIG idea about what the myth <i>means</i> .
