

Final Project And Presentation: Share What You've Learned

This assignment describes your final project and presentation.

Purpose:

Your final project will pull together everything you have been working on this term. It will engage with the social problem that you chose, illuminating inequality, interdependence, and social justice. The final includes the creative project itself AND a presentation to your classmates.

Criteria for Success:

Luckily, I am not an art teacher, so I won't assess your art with great detail. However, I will be looking for evidence that the creative project illuminates the social problem. I also expect that because this is a final project, you will spend the time needed to turn in work that you are proud of.

The class presentation will be 5 minutes and include some reference to your creative project. If you turn in a long research paper, you will likely want a few slides that highlight your findings. If you create an infographic, please display it to your classmates. In your presentation, you should leave time for questions, and expect to answer at least one question from your classmates.

The final creative project and presentation are worth 20% of your class grade.

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Project Options:

This is an opportunity to express in a manner that is chosen by you (paper, art, music, video, etc.) what you have learned/gained from this course. These projects can be done alone or in a group of no more than three of your classmates. The final project is meant to be enjoyable and utilize multiple topics from throughout the term.

Also, there are some creative works and activism that would benefit your college or your community. These options might be useful for you if you don't already have an idea of a social problem to work on. They may also be useful if you like the idea of your work having a purpose that goes beyond a class assignment.

Presentation

You will present your findings in a 5-minute presentation at the end of class. You can pre-record your video, but you should allow some time for questions and answers from the class. Your presentation will include evidence of your final project - perhaps playing the video, displaying the infographic, or teaching the material in your lesson.
