

Students' and Educators' Perspectives about AI: Results from Complementary Surveys

Brief Description

In 2024, there have been a number of surveys about perceptions of using AI in education we could all learn from. In this session, “conversation starters” will involve both reports of surveys conducted with K-12 leaders in our region and graduate students in the Warner School of Education, and short videos summarizing the results of two NSF-funded national surveys conducted with K-12 teachers, and K-12 students and families, respectively. Breakout conversations will focus on making sense of these survey results for our work involving AI applications to education, with brief reports from facilitators to the entire group at the end of the session.
