

Introduction

The GenAl-GELT Instructional Module is designed to utilize generative AI for creating tasks and materials in Global English Language Teaching (GELT). This module focuses on three primary tasks: generating essays that reflect Korean English, assessing and providing feedback on essays written by Korean English learners, and engaging in text-based communication using English as a Lingua Franca (ELF).

The development process is demonstrated through examples of prompts and ChatGPT responses, and it is categorized into three progressively advanced models. The Basic Model employs single-step prompting for simple and direct task execution. The Refined Model 1 uses multi-step prompting with optimized prompts to produce higher-quality outputs. The Refined Model 2 integrates diverse prompting engineering techniques, such as multi-step prompting, prompt optimization, retrieval-augmented generation, instructed prompting, and few-shot prompting, to achieve optimal results.

Clarity & Coherence: Score: 3/5 Evaluation: While the ideas are generally clear, some sentences are difficult to follow due to fragmented structure and lack of transitions, making the flow slightly disjointed. Feedback: Use linking phrases like "Additionally" or "As a result" to connect ideas logically. Revising sentences for conciseness and cohesion will improve readability. For example, changing "because that's required speciality knowledge, so that each talker has a burden" to "because discussing these topics requires specialized knowledge, which can make conversation difficult."	
	4. Vocabulary & Word Choice: Score: 2.5/5 Evaluation: The vocabulary mostly conveys the intended message, but certain word choices (e.g., "quest" instead of "ask" and "speciality" instead of "specialized") detract from clarity. Some phrases like "classify me as salary" are also confusing in English. Feedback: Replace "quest" with "ask" and "speciality" with "specialized knowledge." Rephrase unclear expressions such as "classify me as salary" to	

something like "judge me based on my income" for clarity.

Overall Assessment: Total Score: 12/20

Comments: The essay successfully conveys cultural insights but would benefit from language adjustments to meet Global Englishes standards. Improving grammar, sentence structure, and word choice will help the student communicate effectively while retaining their cultural perspective.

1. Message Analysis

Carefully analyze the user's request to understand the key intent and purpose of the message. This allows for accurately delivering the outcome that the user desires.

Example: When a user requests specific information, determine the exact scope, purpose, and intended use of that information. When the user requests improvements, understand the specific direction and expectations for those improvements.

2. Rewriting Instruction

Based on the message analysis, rewrite the instructions to enable GPT to handle the user's request more effectively. The rewritten instructions should be concise yet clear, focusing on accomplishing the task's objective.

Example: Reflect the analysis results by modifying or adding instructions as needed. Simplify or consolidate complex or redundant instructions so that GPT can operate efficiently.

3. Continuous Optimization

Continuously review and improve the rewritten instructions to ensure they meet the user's expectations and optimize GPT's performance. When new information or changing requirements arise, immediately update the instructions to reflect these changes.

Example: Regularly evaluate if the rewritten instructions are effective in practice and make adjustments as needed. Incorporate user feedback to enhance instruction flexibility.

4. Focus on Efficiency

All instructions should be designed to enhance GPT's workflow, rather than hinder it. Eliminate unnecessary elements and focus the instructions on essential areas.

Example: Optimize the instructions to prevent GPT from providing unnecessary information. Adjust the instructions to concentrate only on aspects directly related to the user's request.

2. Essay Evaluation (Based on Rubric)

Evaluation:

1. Grammar (2):

- Frequent grammatical errors (e.g., "quest weight" for "ask about weight," "he or she wants to classify me as salary").
- Errors hinder readability in places but do not entirely obscure meaning.

2. Vocabulary (3):

- Basic vocabulary with occasional misuse (e.g., "responsibillity to hide her secret").
- Some attempt to use culturally relevant terms (e.g., "Korea manner"), but these require clarification or correction.

3. Coherence (3):

 Points are clear but underdeveloped. For example, the essay mentions cultural norms but lacks detailed examples or evidence to support these ideas.

6. Cultural Appropriateness (4):

 Effectively reflects Korean cultural norms (e.g., avoiding topics like salary and weight) but requires clearer explanations to ensure accessibility for non-Korean readers.

3. Feedback

Strengths:

- The essay provides meaningful insights into Korean cultural norms during small talk, such as avoiding sensitive topics like salary and weight. These cultural points are valuable for readers unfamiliar with Korea.
- The content aligns with the cultural appropriateness criterion by highlighting local norms effectively.

Areas for Improvement:

- Grammar: Focus on correcting subject-verb agreement and sentence fragments (e.g., "because they think he or she wants to classify me as salary" → "because people might feel judged based on their income"). Review verb forms and pluralization rules to enhance clarity.
- Vocabulary: Use precise terms to replace inaccurate phrases (e.g., "quest weight" → "ask about weight"; "Korea manner" → "Korean etiquette"). Expanding vocabulary with culturally rich expressions would also strengthen the essay.

Overall Score: 17/30

The essay has a strong cultural foundation but requires significant improvements in grammar, cohesion, and depth of argumentation. With revisions, it can effectively showcase Korean cultural norms within a global context.
