Book review

- Length: no more than 2,000 words

Policy memo

- Choose a contemporary policy problem relating to the topics of the course e.g. an ongoing civil war, a recently terminated war, or a high risk country
- Write a briefing memo that proposes an actionable, evidence-based policy recommendation
- The audience can be a government agency or department (e.g. Pentagon, USAID, DFID, Foreign Office etc), or an IO (UN, World Bank, etc).
- Length: no more than 1,500 words
