The abstract should include the reason for choosing the topic or the importance of the community service topic, the method of service and a summary of the results. The abstract should end with a brief result or conclusion.

1. INTRODUCTION □ Calisto MT, Bold, 12 pt

The entire article is written in English. The article's content includes an introduction, implementation methods, results

and achievement of objectives, conclusions, acknowledgements, and bibliography. The article is prepared as a soft file in A4 paper format. Margins: top = 2.5cm, bottom = 2.5cm, sides = 2.5cm. The column

width on A4 is 2.5cm. The indent size of the paragraph is 0.5'. The space size is 1.5. The number of pages in the article is at least nine pages.

The article's content in the introduction includes the background to the community service activity, empirical data on the urgency of community service, the purpose of the activity, a literature review, and concrete solutions to the problem through the program carried out in the community service activity. In the background section, the author provides a quantitative portrait, profile, and condition of the target audience involved in the community service activity. The author can describe the conditions and potential of the region in terms of the physical, social, economic, and environmental aspects relevant to the activities carried out. In formulating the problem, the author is asked to formulate concretely and the focus of the study of the problem to be resolved in community service, as well as to explain the objectives achieved in the service activities.

The scope of the literature review is not limited to a discussion of theory but also a discussion of empirical evidence. The content of the literature review refers to a minimum of 20 articles from journals, books, and conference proceedings. It is up-to-date and has a maximum publication year limit of the last 5 years.

The method section contains the application, clearly and concisely outlines the method used to achieve the objectives in the community service activities, and provides a flowchart for implementing the community service activities. The results of the service must be measurable, and the author is asked to describe the measuring instrument used descriptively and qualitatively. The method describes how to measure the level of achievement and success of the service activity.

Results

The presentation of results and discussion account for 50-60% of the article's length. The content of the results in the service article relates to the results of data analysis, which can be supplemented with tables or graphs to clarify the findings explicitly.

In the results and discussion, the author outlines the findings of the service activities that have changed individuals/communities and institutions in the short and long term. This section explains how the activities are carried out to achieve the objectives.

The author explains the indicators of achievement of objectives and the benchmarks used to determine the success of the community service activities that have been carried out. In the discussion, the author reveals the strengths and weaknesses of the outputs or main focus of the activities in terms of their suitability to the conditions of the community

where the activities are carried out, the level of difficulty of implementing the activities and producing goods, and opportunities for future development.

Discussion

The discussion in the article can be reinforced with relevant documentation related to services or products as outputs or the main focus of community service activities. Documentation can be in the form of images of the implementation or execution process, images of product prototypes, tables, graphs, and so on.

The author describes significant findings in implementing community service programmes or training. The author can relate the findings to the approach used in implementing the activity, which is reviewed based on a literature study. The author can mention existing obstacles, for example, limited time, facilities, or the condition of the participants, which slightly hinder the effectiveness of the activity in achieving maximum results (if any).

The author provides

recommendations for the development of community service programmes in the future (mention recommendations, for example, provision of more adequate tools, advanced training, or expansion of the scope of activities) in the discussion so that the knowledge of the participants through sustainable programmes is beneficial in the long term.

Tables and figures are written based on the sequence number of their appearance in the article manuscript. Tables and figures must be given a short and clear title. The writing after or before the figure and table has a space of 1 line; an example of the table display can be seen in Table 1.

The image's resolution in the manuscript must be of good quality. The images displayed in the article manuscript are documentation related to the discussion of the manuscript.

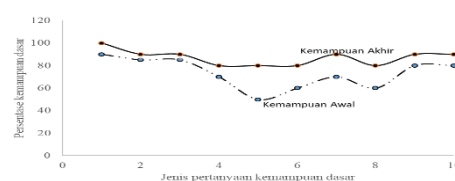


Figure 1. Results of the basic ability test of participants tested at the beginning and end of the service activity.

involved; 3) Obstacles or challenges: If any, mention the challenges faced during the implementation of the activity; and 4) Recommendations: Provide suggestions for future activities, whether in the form of follow-up or improvements to future programs.
