YOU CAN, HOWEVER, FIND IT BEING SOLD THROUGH OTHER ONLINE PROVIDERS. YOU CAN ALSO PURCHASE A USED COPY OF EITHER BOOK FROM A GRADUATING SENIOR WHO HAS TAKEN THE COURSE. 2. Textbook Activities

- Read Chapter 1 (American Government and Politics), pages 4-16 in the textbook Presidential Election Update American Government: Stories of a Nation: For the AP Course. You are not required to take notes as you read, but it is highly recommended that you complete this reading, and future readings, to have a deep understanding of the course content.
 - One strategy is to make a copy of the Chapter 1 textbook presentation here and add your notes to the existing presentation, which can then be used later for review.
- Define the following key terms from Chapter 1. Choose a method that works best for you. Some students write the definitions by hand in a notebook and keep an ongoing list. Some use a digital document with an ongoing list, and some prefer Quizlet. It is recommended that you use the textbook's definitions because those will be used on the vocabulary quizzes you have in class. These will be checked IN CLASS, FOR COMPLETION, ON MONDAY, AUGUST 25.

You can make a digital copy of the document, complete the MCQs, and then upload your answers to Google Classroom, OR you can print out a copy, complete it by hand, take a photo of your completed MCQs, and then upload the images to Google Classroom.
- Read pages 3 and 4, How to Master the Foundational Documents, in the
 Document Reader for American Government: Stories of a Nation: For the AP®
 Course. There are a total of 9 required foundational documents that you will have
 to know and understand by May 2026. You are encouraged to highlight and
 annotate as you read through this section. The recommendations found here are
 very valuable. This is NOT GRADED.
- Read the Declaration of Independence on pages 5 11 of the Document Reader for American Government: Stories of a Nation: For the AP® Course. As you read, you are required to annotate (at least 3 per page). Annotations may include but are not limited to those noted below. The purpose of your annotations should be that they allow you to go back and understand key parts of the text, and your annotations should allow you to discuss the text with your classmates. This will be checked IN CLASS, FOR COMPLETION, ON MONDAY, AUGUST 25.
 - Circling/underlining unfamiliar words and then defining them
 - Underlining key passages
 - Recording questions, connections, key discoveries, and confusions
- Answer the 4 Check for Understanding questions on page 11. Please write in full sentences and be sure to actually "explain" and "describe." Please <u>UPLOAD TO</u> <u>GOOGLE CLASSROOM</u> under the appropriate assignment when done.
