Overview:

This course will focus on the basic structure and design requirements of graphics for the web and web page development. All students are encouraged to take this course as an introduction to web design. Students will learn the basics of Adobe Photoshop CC 2025, Adobe Dreamweaver CC 2025, HTML5, and CSS3. Students will focus on learning design concepts and applying them using HTML5 and CSS3 to code fully functional web pages.

This course is a complete introduction to web design and code. No experience is needed.

This course is part of the Career & Technical Education (CTE) program at Bainbridge Island School District. Students enrolled in this course are invited to extend their learning beyond the classroom through participation in Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA), where they can explore real-world applications of their skills, collaborate with peers, and engage in leadership opportunities.

Course Site

The Google Classroom Code will be given out in class. Assignments will be posted and submitted via Google Classroom. Students must enroll in our Google Classroom; if parents/guardians would like to receive Guardian Summaries, they can contact any of their child's teachers to sign up.

- Development of intermediate HTML coding skills
- Development of intermediate CSS coding skills
- Ability to create a working storyboard/workflow for a website
- Demonstration of knowledge of principles of website design
