Hand model -- one hand is experience/ other hand is beliefs

Want kids to hear, feel, and see what moments in history are like

New nonfiction definition - shows new knowledge is taking place, explores ill-defined problems How to we get kids to know that everything they read is not just that / things are open to debate and inquiry

KAKAPO RESCUE - would be considered "new" nonfiction

Did this in a 5th grade classroom

Knowledge is a moving target

They examined excerpts from the book

They situated their learning

Examined the problem

Charted some facts from the text on group chart

Also charted some "not really" facts from the text

Explored the website / copied off some of the ranger reports / had kids examine them in groups Gave kids chart to fill in

If we over-direct, takes entire research/organization piece away from students

Then they presented what they learned

check out the list of books she might use again!! - new nonfiction list

Joyce sidman gave a framework for writing a poem: write a description, a question, a wish Did some research on an animal of choice / used Dark Emperor as mentor Tried writing a poem together first

First step is to become an expert in your classroom - you need to read the books they need to read

Need to be "book central"

Get books into kids hands - book surveys, confer, book paths, book talks, reviews, social networks

Jennifer has a "readers bill of rights" with her MS students

Ask to borrow a book student is reading when they are done / start a connection

Assess is more than a number

Assess and instruction are inseparable!!!!!!

Assess must meet high standards and still be developmentally appropriate

Used No David to share how to teach core standards / this would be a powerful tool to use in teacher training - they worked their way through all 10 reading CC standards using just this book

Core wants us to focus on what text says first before they start making connections

Using simple texts is critical to teaching kids skills they need to have

They literally walked us through all reading standards 1-10 using no David - powerful!

1,2,3 are the "what" of the text

4.5.6 are the craft

7,8,9 are integration of knowledge

We need to let kids construct our text sets, not only look at core recs

Books that would be in a set with No David:

- When Sophie gets angry really, really angry
- Harriet you'll drive me wild
- Good night monkey boy
- No nap
- Knuffle bunny
- The boss baby
- Roscoe Riley series
- Freckle juice
- Frindle
- Tiger rising

We need to lift the quality of students post-it notes - need deeper thinking
With only 10 reading standards, be clear about what we are really asking of kids
We need to build on each grade -- where are we expecting prompt and support, independent application, secure application - would be great conversation to have as a school building
Took common core and proficient reader research to guide their curriculum planning for units of study

If we have a common language of talking with kids, it helps kids know what to understand and expect

How do we look at kids over multiple data points????????????

We need to make sure kids know why we're doing what we are doing with assessments The magic will come from an increased attention to formative assessments in the richest and best sense of the word - Lucy Calkins

How we can we do more data collecting AS we teach?

What is guided practice - small group, conferences

Need to link assessment and classrm planning

With assessment day, we need to have a display that clearly shows what I need to teach Showed an example of a frequency table

After looking at the data, what are the 4 or 5 main lessons kids need?

What are the strategies we need to work on in small group

"I expect kids to be amazing readers and writers"

Routine - flexible predictability /consistent structure across day

Respect - embedded throughout

Resist - try to resist talking so we can listen

Resist teaching so we can learn and answering so we can question

Patrick Allen

Has come up with the "Newfie" theory of conferring - it's about nudging

It's about knowing when we should stop

Creating heart beating moments as readers - guides his rdg conferences

Readers depend on: trust, respect, and tone

Developing independence - teach, model, empower

We need kids to read like a witness

He has 4 goals for his students: understand, remember, extend meaning, make rdg experiences memorable

Tony Keefer

how do you build a writing community?

Time - has 60 minutes a day

Commitment - you're either in or you're out, there is no such thing as life in between

Critical conversations - teaching kids how to become mentors for one another / has worked hard to teach those skills / has committed a lot of time to this

Trust - first, he had to trust himself to let go / needs to listen to his kids and then trust the process

Joy - is way more than just fun / it nourishes and enriches you / it's about fulfillment

Anita silvey talks about ordinary people doing extraordinary things

Dedication of book is to the primary source - doesn't go near a topic if she can't get at least 1

primary source

Thinks this is something we need to provide more opportunities for students to do in addition to internet research

Kate DiCamillo had 440 rejections before someone accepted a piece

Holes by Sachar went through 5 complete revisions - great book to study with kids

Wow!!! - Anita silvey knows more about book and author back stories than I can ever know

Lindsey Leavitt - from Vegas

Snapshot activity - Write 3 observations abt your character:

Get specific in description, describe outfit, point out details that show us more who the character

Great book to do this with - chrysanthemum, fancy nancy

Show not tell is important

Character traits should heighten the conflict, be real life experiences

writers should be allowed to write garbage

Using social networking to guide what a character tells - info easily accessible online, likes, bays, relationships, create character outlines, collages/Pinterest - helps her visualize her characters

Lucy Calkins

Shared curriculum and planning is critical for educators

Analyzing characters should not look the same in 1st grade and 5th grade / used koala Lou as an example

Most powerful words in workshop: "off you go"

Begin year asking kids to do an on demand writing in 3 genres: narrative, informational, opinion

Do another on demand writing after a unit of study has been completed

Checklist mentality is a mind numbing mentality at times if done incorrectly

Need to use it with students in thoughtful way - have them reflect about their writing

Mastery comes from Deliberate practice

Let this convention remind us that it takes communities of practice together

Mary Ehrenworth

Designing and implementing performance assessments

*****Students don't need good classrooms, they need good schools*****

Some inquiry questions:

Assess skills or content?

Make task authentic

Role of logical sequence and explanatory language

**make sure kids know WHY they are learning certain genres of writing, such as opinion

Example: should mayors continue to fund zoos?

Need to provide students with information from both points of view - share one stance, then the other

Opinion writing needs to move kids from $\underline{\textbf{position and preference}}$ to $\underline{\textbf{position and evidence}}$

Tips:

Give multi level texts

Give yourself enough time to look at and analyze student work

Practice scoring together across grade level to establish norms

Develop small groups based on student responses

Distinguish between reading strand and writing strand

Carry across disciplines

Compare to other on-demand writing
