

-Resolution:

Preambulatory Clauses:

1. Alarmed by the exorbitant amount of money spent by the Qatar government on the world cup, which is not 2 times larger than the previous world cup, but 14 times, resulting in this world cup having the largest amount spent.
2. Recognizing that FIFA is a corrupt organization that continuously makes bad judgments about world cup hosts, and doubts the reliability of the 118-year-old organization
3. Expecting FIFA to be trustworthy and responsible for any corrupt action and getting falsified for the involvement of bribing and government involvement.
4. Deeply Convinced the FIFA society that they are not responsible for any action taken and try to avoid/resist any roomers.
5. Upset with the Qatari government for the impromptu banning of beer 2 days before the start of the world cup, after sponsor Budweiser spent 75 million dollars to be the official beer sponsor.
6. Draws the attention of many governments, including the US to investigate from the start to the end of the World Cup.
7. Congratulating Argentina's triumph in the FIFA World Cup 2022, although many in the FIFA World Cup society think that the game between Argentina and France was rigged and unjust to the other countries, leading many to believe that France should be the true World Cup champion.

1. Promotes the reorganization of the FIFA world cup voting procedure. Invalidates host nations without 8 stadiums with the capacity to hold upwards of eighty thousand people.
 - a. It may be possible to significantly reduce corruption at the most viewed sporting event in the world by filing reports on the selection of FIFA World Cup host nations.
 - i. That makes sure that the selection process is open and fair and prevents bribery and other forms of corruption from influencing the decision.
 - ii. A thorough report also gives interested parties the chance to challenge the choice and offer feedback in a more planned and methodical way. Thus making it easier and making sure that the final choice is advantageous to all parties as well as to sport in general.
 - b. Incorporate a committee to oversee and visit working sites

- i. To monitor and inspect work sites, thus working to minimize corruption at the Qatar world cup. Also, this could help keep an eye on the construction process and audit any potential wrongdoings.
 - 1. This will enable this committee to identify any instances of bribery or fraud and take action against those responsible. Furthermore, it also will allow this committee to monitor the progress of the construction and make sure that the necessary standards and regulations are being adhered to.
 - ii. By visiting working sites, the committee will be able to ensure that the Qatar World Cup is successful and remains free of any form of corruption.

 - 2. Encourages the nullification of a similar bid to Qatar for the 2022 world cup, from Egypt-Greece-Saudi Arabia for the 2030 world cup.
 - a. The bid has little to no infrastructure for the world cup and its ambassadors claim that the stadiums meant to host the world cup are currently in the process of being built
 - i. This will stop the same circumstance in which Qatar was elected.
 - b. The bidding nations have human rights violations similar to Qatars, and in some cases even exceed.
 - i. Out of the 35 million residents of Saudi Arabia, 10 million are migrant workers, comprising $\frac{1}{3}$ of the Saudi population.
- 3. Demands the creation of a UN organization that oversees the reorganization of the FIFA governing body
 - a. The organization would have powers similar to UNICEF, WHO, IMF, UNESCO, and UN peacekeeping forces.
 - b. The organization is separate and not tied to any specific countries or governments
 - c. Includes campaigns throughout the World Cup that encourage unity, health, and nondiscrimination with the aim of positive change.
- 4. Include impartial, reliable organizations to examine the financial aspects of the Qatar world cup.
 - A. It is crucial to include impartial, reliable organizations to examine the financial costs of upcoming world cups.
 - B. This would guarantee the transparency of the spending and aid in finding any potential instances of waste or misuse.
 - C. The independent agencies should have the authority to examine and audit all financial aspects of the event and should be independent of the local government. They should also

be given the power to make the necessary corrections and guarantee that the spending is in keeping with the predetermined budget.

- D. This would make it easier to guarantee that the World Cup is run fairly and responsibly, with no unnecessary spending.

5. Calls upon the collaboration of the International Labour Organization with FIFA to ensure:

- A. Safe working conditions
- B. The health of individual workers
- C. Workers receiving appropriate salaries
- D. Emits the contracts of labor forces upon workers (Kafala system)

6. Draws attention to the poorly refereed games. This resolution calls for the replaying of the games with new referees

- a. The Netherlands v Argentina game had a total of 17 yellow cards. The game was officiated by a referee known for his instigative tactics.
- b. The France v Argentina game was evidently rigged in favor of Argentina and Messi with the very weak penalty call
- c. The Argentina v Croatia game was blatantly rigged as Livakovic was not ready for the penalty and Messi knew that and so took advantage of the GK.
- d. The Germany v Japan game was clearly influenced by Blue Lock writer and artist Muneyuki Kaneshiro, and it silences the voices of German human rights supporters.

7. Take note that the sides who have previously hosted the World Cup are now aiding and supporting Qatar while they are currently mired in controversy like they once were.

- a. The Korean Football Association bribed referee Byron Moreno to give the South Korean NT a penalty which caused South Korea to win against tournament favorites Italy
- b. Thirty-Three Russian footballers were found to be using steroids or doped. Many of these players were called up for the national team
