Welcome to the Cambridge Neighborhood Aid Network! In these fast-moving and uncertain times, it's important that we show up for each other and remember that we are not alone. We are setting this up based on the efforts of Somerville/Medford and Jamaica Plain's mutual aid groups.

The Coronavirus pandemic is rapidly changing the way society functions. In order to mitigate the spread of the disease, people are practicing social distancing. This slows down the rate of infection enough to both lower the ultimate number of people infected, and spread those infections out over many months to ensure adequate care as the healthcare system becomes overwhelmed. However, **neighbors need to help neighbors right now**, and this is especially true for vulnerable populations such as the elderly or immunocompromised. People may need help obtaining groceries or remote support. **Most importantly, they will know they are not alone.** The Neighborhood Aid Network has one simple goal: To provide a platform for volunteers to coordinate care on a neighborhood basis. Also, we are partnering with the <u>Human Network Initiative</u> at Harvard Medical School to help coordinate these efforts across the region.

1. <u>Current Offerings</u> Google Form

2. Current Needs List

If there is anything you need that is not found on the above offerings spreadsheet, you can request assistance using this form, or edit our spreadsheet directly. Whichever way you submit your needs they both end up in the same place -- whatever is most technologically comfortable for you. There is no ask for assistance that is too big or small, and no one will ever be shamed for asking for what they need. If you'd prefer to not add your name + contact information on this public spreadsheet, you can email us at cambridgemutualaid@gmail.com with your request and we can add it to the sheet for you anonymously.

3. Neighborhood Pods:

Pods are hyperlocal text message groups or phone trees of you and your neighbors. Since not everyone has access to online communication or will ever see these google docs, neighborhood pods are how we reach more people. We are asking for folks to sign up as Neighborhood Point People, where you'd take on the responsibility of reaching out to your neighbors, moderating a neighborhood group chat or phone tree (on whatsapp or another communication tool), and staying in touch with the other point people for resource sharing. <u>Somerville Cambridge Elder Services</u> Looking for Volunteers to:

- Pick up food at the agency to deliver to clients who usually get grocery delivery and are
 not receiving it at this time. To do this, we'd require volunteers who are able to drive to
 our office, carry a 15 pound bag of food and deliver it to a client's home, leaving it
 outside to avoid exposure to the client.
- Calling clients who may be isolated to check-in. We would match a client with a
 volunteer and ask that they call 1-3 times per week (or whatever is decided upon
 between the client and the volunteer). Volunteers must feel comfortable calling clients
 from their own homes with their personal phones. We would especially need volunteers
 who speak languages other than English, in particular Spanish, Portuguese, Mandarin
 and Creole.
- If you know of anyone looking to donate to local organizations, monetary donations
 would be very appreciated so we can address needs of clients as they come up, mainly
 food and supplies outside of what Nutrition and Homecare can currently provide. To do
