We hosted St Nicolas School for three sets of football fixtures, all three sets of fixtures were mixed fixtures of boys and girls on the same team and we played both A and B team games on the same day, we had a Year 3/4 fixture, Year 5 fixture and Year 6 fixture. We also had individual success with 2 boys selected to represent Newbury District Primary School Football Association for the 2020/21 season and 4 further boys have been selected to represent Newbury District Primary Schools Football Association for the 2021/22 season. 1 boy took part in the British Biathlete Championships and could still qualify for the Great British team for the European Championships.

It has also resulted in a reduction of behaviour incidents, as evidenced through the Pastoral Report. Our baseline and end of session evaluations show that the children felt they had improved in their problem solving skills and independence they also commented that they had increased in confidence during the sessions.
An early morning sports club to encourage pupils to have an active start to the day. Something that will benefit all children as they move through the school.</p>			

	<p>Positive selling point for new EYFS prospective parents showing that outdoor education is important starting in EYFS and progressing through to Forest Schools for all year groups right up to year 6.</p> <p>Spent £162.70 Swimming for autumn term. Originally, wanted to subsidise the cost of swimming lessons as class sizes had gone down from last year and cost was going up. We also believe swimming is an important life skill for our students particular as our location has much open water. After committing Autumn money, we realised that swimming could not be used for sports premium.</p>
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
