Topic A

Collect quotations on a key topic - on each theme they can be put in any order you want. They can be from secondary sources (like definitions of key terms) or from primary sources (strongest sources of authority). You might only have a single topic, but perhaps you will find many subtopics you wish to outline.

Each quotation from a primary source should be **introduced by basic information** about the text:

1. Who is the author (name)

¹ Thesis is a fancy way of saying, "what is your take" or what will you be arguing.

- 2. When did they live;
- 3. When was the text written;
- 4. What is the title of the work the quotation is from

Each quotation needs to be **followed by a clear statement of the quotation's significance**, i.e. This quotation shows that wars against non-Christians are permissible. And then a later quotation might help you argue that due to the Schism between East and West, the Byzantine Church can be considered heretical, thus capturing Constantiople would be a just war. PLEASE NOTE: this is not a historical argument!
