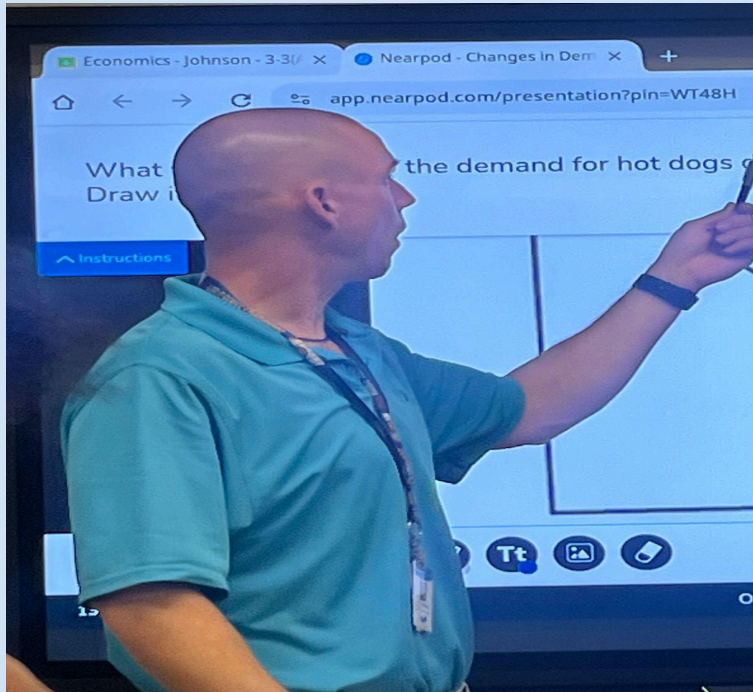


## Teacher of the Issue: Mr. Johnson
