AP Literature and Composition

The course focuses on how and why a story is told is more important than the story itself. With that understanding, students can begin to approach literature in a critical and analytical manner.

The primary objective of the AP Literature course is to prepare students for the rigorous and extensive study of literature in future college English courses. Within this preparation, there will be a focus on strategies to foster success on the AP Literature examination.

Many of the major assessments will mirror the multiple choice and essay prompts on the AP exam, and will be graded accordingly. Students will have the opportunity to revise major papers after conferencing with the teacher. Additional assessments will include completion of close reading study questions, student-constructed critical analysis questions, and student-led discussions.

B. Writing: analytical and evaluative essays, independent novel projects, research paper
