

LEVEL 2 Democracy, Liberty & Justice 2DLJ

What is this course about?

He aha te mea nui o te ao? He tāngata!

What is the most important thing in the world? It is people!

This course is all about social justice and the role of big organisations in our society. In Term 1, we will dedicate some time to the exploration of environmental concerns. In the course of this exploration, we will consider the roles and responsibilities that governments, corporations, organisations, and individuals might have in addressing environmental concerns. During this term, there will be a focus on democracy and politics. In Term 2, we will turn our attention to human rights abuses and social justice issues. We will learn about the efforts of activists and the way that they promote social change before becoming active participants ourselves. During this term, there will be a focus on liberty - on the freedoms and rights that we are afforded by documents such as the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and by the philosophies of our governments. In Term 3, we will focus on the legal system. We will investigate the factors that contribute to criminal behaviour, attitudes towards criminality and towards punishment, and the repercussions that crime has on communities and individuals. During this term, students will have the opportunity to explore an area of interest relating to the justice system - whether it be crime, punishment, prevention, policy, or beyond. This is a dynamic course that requires critical thinking, thoughtful discussion, and an open mind.

What sorts of things will I do?

- We will debate topical and controversial ideas.
- We will consider a variety of perspectives and ideologies.
- We will make judgments and determinations about social changes and social responsibilities.
- We will explore the social causes of crime and the different approaches to punishment.
- We will investigate human rights abuses and other social harms.
- We will make attempts to positively influence changes to the world around us and to social policy.
- We will consider, argue, and justify our own perspectives.
