For three festivals, teachers will upload videos of student performances to be evaluated by a selection of educators and experienced judges! Students will receive commentary and feedback aimed at helping them improve their speaking, performance, and communication skills! This year, we are excited to announce that for one additional festival, students will be able to compete synchronously in a live virtual festival!

Students will receive recognition for their video submissions along with feedback from the evaluators! Teachers will also receive school recognition to display in their classroom, offices, or trophy cases!

We will be using a rubric based evaluation system so all parents, teachers, and college students are welcome to judge. For Middle-School divisions, students in grades 11 or 12 can also serve as judges. This is the best way to learn more about our online events.

How do I get involved?

If you are interested in submitting your students' work, [complete this form](#). We will need permission forms from your school administrator and students' parents. We do ask that teachers who submit videos help with the judging of other student videos. You will not be asked to provide feedback on any student from your own school. If you have other educators who would like to help, please let us know. We will provide all feedback forms, rubrics, and models to help you provide feedback!



What is the cost?

Those schools who have the capability of offering a \$10 registration fee for each student submission will be welcomed. All collected fees will be used toward student recognition at the end of the year.

If you are a school that is having difficulty with paying the registration fee, especially if you are a new program, please contact gyablon@hudsoncharter.org to see if we can provide accommodations for your program.

What recognition will my students receive?

All student submissions, provided they meet the event criteria, will be evaluated and receive a designation such as Gold, Silver, or Bronze. Students will receive certificates or medals highlighting their achievement!

Teachers will also receive a framed certificate to display in their classrooms or schools!

Do I need to join the NJSDL in order to participate?



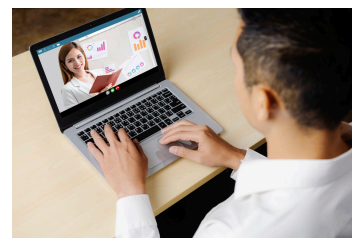
New Jersey schools who register will receive an introductory school membership to the league, free of charge. **If you would like to participate in additional league events, beyond the online festival series**, you may join as a full member by paying the league registration fee of \$200.00. Again, schools who are only participating in the online speech festival will not need to pay any registration fees.

What other types of events does the NJSDL offer schools and students?

The NJSDL is the New Jersey district affiliate of the National Speech and Debate Association. Our league schools offer in-person competitions throughout the year, culminating in the NJSDL State Championships in March.

Do we need to supply judges?

We ask schools to supply one judge for every 5 entries (or fraction thereof). We will be using a rubric based evaluation system so all parents, teachers, and college students are welcome to judge. For Middle-School divisions, students in grades 11 or 12 can also serve as judges. All judges need to be mindful of the due dates for each round's rankings, and be available for both preliminary and finals rounds.



Event Descriptions / Rules

Rounds in Tournaments

- Each event will have at least four rounds (ideally three preliminary rounds and one finals round).
 - If all competitors in an event are in a single panel for all preliminary rounds, no final round is required. A subsequent preliminary round may be held at the discretion of the tournament director.
 - Events with less than or equal to 30 total entries will have one finals round.
 - Events with 31+ entries will have two elimination rounds (a semifinals AND finals) scheduling permitted.

For High School Events:

- All high school events except Declamation, Prose, and Poetry will follow [NSDA rules found in the High School Unified Manual](#), including Pro Con Challenge, Congressional Debate Authorship Challenge, Prepared Prompt, and Original Spoken Word Poetry.
 - For Pro/Con Challenge and Congressional Debate Authorship Challenge, students would submit one unedited video showing two separate speeches.
 - Pro/Con's time limit is 3-5 minutes per speech, while showing the Pro and Con side to the same topic.
 - Congressional Debate Authorship's time limit is 2-3 minutes per speech, while showing a Pro or Con speech for two separate pieces of legislation.
- Declamation, Prose, and Poetry will follow [NCFL rules](#).
