

Contemporary Quran Template Title

(The title should represent the entire article, encompassing the formal object of research, material object of research, and context of research, and must not exceed 20 words. Use Book Antiqua font (14pt), in bold.)

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Abstract

These guidelines outline the new format and manuscript template for articles published in *Contemporary Quran*. The article should start with the title, followed by the author's name, affiliation, author's affiliation address, and email address. Next, an abstract of 200-250 words should be included. For both English and Indonesian articles, the abstract should first be written in English, followed by an abstract in Indonesian. For Arabic articles, the abstract should first be written in English, followed by an abstract in Arabic. The abstract must clearly state the core issue being addressed, the method used, and the key findings and conclusions. Each abstract should be written as a single paragraph in a one-column format. Keywords should consist of three words that reflect the theme, findings, and other significant aspects of the article. The abstract for both English and Indonesian articles should be written in Book Antiqua font, size 11pt. The abstract for Arabic articles should be written in Amiri font, size 11pt.

Abstrak:

Petunjuk ini merupakan format baru sekaligus template manuskrip/artikel yang digunakan pada artikel yang diterbitkan di *Contemporary Quran*. Artikel diawali dengan judul artikel, nama penulis, alamat afiliasi penulis dan email penulis diikuti dengan abstrak sepanjang 200-250 kata. Baik artikel yang berbahasa Inggris maupun Indonesia, abstrak dimulai dengan abstrak yang ditulis dalam bahasa Inggris dan diikuti abstrak dalam bahasa Indonesia. Artikel yang berbahasa Arab, abstrak dimulai dengan abstrak yang ditulis dalam bahasa Inggris dan diikuti abstrak dalam bahasa Arab. Bagian abstrak harus memuat inti permasalahan yang akan dikemukakan, metode pemecahannya, dan hasil-hasil temuan yang diperoleh serta simpulan. Abstrak untuk masing-masing bahasa hanya boleh dituliskan dalam satu paragraf saja dengan format satu kolom. Kata kunci ditulis 3 kata yang mencerminkan tema, temuan, dan aspek penting lainnya. Abstrak dalam bahasa Inggris dan Indonesia ditulis dengan menggunakan font Book Antiqua



ukuran 11pt. Abstrak dalam bahasa Arab ditulis dengan menggunakan font Amiri ukuran 11pt.

الملخص:

تُعد هذه الإرشادات نموذجاً جديداً وقوالباً للمخطوطات/المقالات المستخدمة في المقالات المنشورة في مجلة «Contemporary Quran». تبدأ المقالة بعنوان المقالة، واسم المؤلف، وعنوان الجهة التي ينتمي إليها المؤلف، وعنوان بريده الإلكتروني، يليها ملخص يتراوح طوله بين 200 و250 كلمة. وسواء كانت المقالة باللغة الإنجليزية أو الإندونيسية، يبدأ الملخص بنسخة باللغة الإنجليزية، تليها نسخة باللغة الإندونيسية. أما بالنسبة للمقالات المكتوبة باللغة العربية، فيبدأ الملخص بملخص مكتوب باللغة الإنجليزية، يليه ملخص باللغة العربية. يجب أن يتضمن الملخص جوهر المشكلة التي سيتم طرحها، وطرق حلها، والنتائج التي تم التوصل إليها، بالإضافة إلى الاستنتاجات. ويجب أن يُكتب الملخص لكل لغة في فقرة واحدة فقط بتنسيق عمود واحد. تتألف الكلمات المفتاحية من 3 كلمات تعكس الموضوع والنتائج والجوانب المهمة الأخرى. تُكتب الملخصات باللغتين الإنجليزية والإندونيسية باستخدام خط Book Antiqua بحجم 11pt. أما الملخص باللغة العربية فيُكتب باستخدام خط Amiri بحجم 11pt.

Introduction (Book Antiqua, 12pt for English and Indonesian; Amiri, 12 pt for Arabic)

The body of the paper should be between 5,000 and 7,000 words, including the abstract, references, and footnotes. It should be written in Book Antiqua font, size 12, with single line spacing for English and Indonesian; and in Amiri font, size 12 with single line spacing for Arabic. This section should concisely cover the following points: (1.) What is already known about the topic related to the paper? (2) What is not known, and what does the study aim to examine or present? Typically, the background can be summarized in 2–3 sentences, each addressing a different aspect of the relevant information. The purpose of the background is to provide context and lead smoothly into a description of the study's methods.

The Introduction outlines the problem investigated, providing enough information for readers to understand the specific objectives within a broader theoretical framework. After situating the research in a larger context, the specific research questions should be stated. This section may also include a summary of previous research on the topic and how the current study will contribute to or expand existing knowledge. All background information from other sources must be properly cited.

The Introduction should also briefly mention the research methods. This is typically the second-longest section of the abstract and should provide enough

detail to give the reader a clear understanding of what was done and the key questions that the Methods section will address.

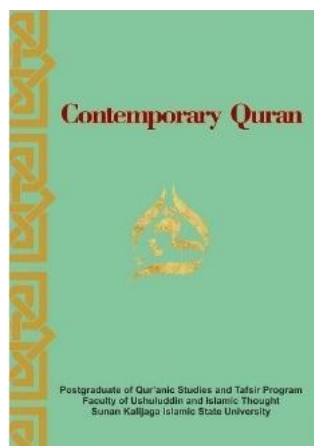
Result and Discussion

The Discussion and Results should be combined into one continuous section, starting with the main results followed by supporting results, accompanied by a discussion. Any figures and tables (if included) should be integrated within this section and are subject to active editing by the editors.

Conclusion

Authors are advised to avoid repeating the abstract in the conclusion. This section should clearly state the implications of the findings, directly addressing the problem or question posed in the introduction. It should not provide reasons for the conclusions drawn—those should have already been discussed in the Discussion section. Ideally, by reading just the Introduction and Conclusion, a reader should understand the main focus of the research and the key findings, even if they are not familiar with the specific methodologies used.

Complete the following declarations as applicable to the manuscript. Where a declaration does not apply, state “Not applicable” where appropriate:

Acknowledgements

All acknowledgements (assuming any) ought to be remembered in a separate section before the references and may incorporate a list of peoples who supported and contributed to the research work in any way.

Author Contributions

Specifies the exact contributions of each author in a narrative form, including their respective roles in the conception of the study, methodology, data collection, analysis, interpretation, and manuscript preparation.

Competing Interest

Authors must disclose any financial, institutional, professional, personal, or other competing interests. If none exist, state: The authors declare that there are no competing interests related to the research, authorship, or publication of this article.

Funding source

The funding source section will be added if there is any funding source or supporting grant to the proposed research piece. It will be mentioned here in this section with the full name of the funding agency and supporting grant with the grant number.

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References

References in your manuscript must be recent, typically from the last 5 to 10 years, and should include a minimum of 30 references, with at least 40% sourced from primary sources or journals. All references should be accessible to the public. Authors are responsible for ensuring that all reference details are complete and accurate. Every reference must be cited within the text; otherwise, it will be automatically removed. Bibliographies should be managed using reference management software such as Mendeley. The *Contemporary Quran* follows the Chicago Manual of Style 17th edition (fullnote) format for citations.
