The approach to the course is to have fun in a non-threatening environment. It isn't important to have a background in law. What the course will offer is a basic understanding of the law and how it is applied in everyday situations. A 1ot of class discussion will focus on principles of law associated with criminal law, civil law family law and the Youth Justice Act. There will be numerous guest speakers who will discuss their area of experience such as civil and criminal lawyers, judges, police officers, etc. Field trips are planned to see provincial and Supreme Court cases, a law firm, the police museum; to name a few...

This is a course that requires reading. Be sure to come to class prepared with notes from your readings so that you can participate productively. Class notes and reading notes form an integral part of your learning experience and mark.

Course Topics Law 12 Course Outline (not in order)

- Civil and Legal Rights, Law and Society, and the Classification of Law.

• <u>Guest speaker</u>: You will be assigned to a group to identify a controversial area of law, and invite a representative from an organization that will help our class understand the issues related- to this area of law. Examples might include police officer, community leaders, politicians, lawyers, officers of the court, including such organizations as, Amnesty International or **LEAF**

- Weird /bizarre and Unusual Cases: You and your partner will present an unusual/bizarre/funny case involving any area of law.
- Horrific Historic cases: You and your partner will present a horrific caseserial killer, etc. Power point.
- <u>Social Justice Seminar</u>: You and a partner will be responsible to lead a discussion on a controversial issue through a visual presentation
- Law Movie/ Film Criticism: Each term we will watch <u>1 movie</u> that demonstrates an area of law.

- Letter writing campaign: I will be bringing in a representative from either LEAF or Amnesty International to introduce a controversial topic of law where we as a class can decide what action we can take to move to resolving the issue.

- <u>Field Trip:</u> Your class will be visiting a Federal and Provincial Court during Term 1, 2 and 3... and possibly E-COMM. To accomplish this there will be- a cost of covering the **EOC** to allow us to have these opportunities
