Introduction & Context

The Writer’s Perspective

The writing of Genesis is attributed to **Moses**. He was writing to a generation of Israelites who needed to know how and why they ended up in Egypt in the first place. He wanted them to see that their presence in a foreign land wasn't an accident, but a divine appointment. Please take the time to look over each page of this packet before beginning.

Key Themes for May

- **Sovereignty in Suffering:** God is often most active when He seems most silent. Joseph’s journey from pit to prison to palace proves that God never loses control.
- **The Messy Family of God:** Genesis doesn't hide the flaws of the Patriarchs. We see jealousy, deception, and failure—yet God remains committed to His covenant.
- **Forgiveness & Reconciliation:** The climax of the book isn't Joseph’s power, but his decision to forgive his brothers, echoing the grace God shows us.

"Did You Know?" Sidebars for May

1. Why the story of Judah and Tamar (Chapter 38)?

It seems like a strange interruption to the Joseph story, but it's vital! It shows the moral decline of the brothers in Canaan, explaining *why* God needed to move them to Egypt to preserve them as a holy people. Plus, Tamar and Judah are direct ancestors of **Jesus**.

2. The Significance of "Goshen"

Goshen was the best land in Egypt for livestock. By placing the Israelites there, God provided for them during the famine and kept them physically separated from Egyptian idolatry, allowing the family of 70 to grow into a nation of millions.

3. The Prophecy of the Scepter (Gen 49:10)

When Jacob blesses Judah, he says the "scepter shall not depart" from him. Even though Joseph had the political power at the time, Jacob prophesied that the **True King (The Messiah)** would come from the tribe of Judah.

Final Thought for the Month:

"As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good." (Gen 50:20) —

As we finish Genesis, remember that your current "pit" or "prison" is not the end of your story. God is still writing the "palace" chapter.
