- **Description:** The DUX Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Standing Group has been working to compile resources to help support Alliance libraries experiencing intellectual freedom challenges. Definitions

- Intellectual freedom is the right of every individual to both seek and receive information from all points of view without restriction. It provides for free access to all expressions of ideas through which any and all sides of a question, cause or movement may be explored.
- A challenge is an attempt to remove or restrict materials, based upon the
 objections of a person or group. A banning is the removal of those materials.
 Challenges do not simply involve a person expressing a point of view; rather,
 they are an attempt to remove material from the curriculum or library,
 thereby restricting the access of others.

Privacy Support

- All Zoom polls will be anonymous. (No collection of identifying information.)
- All Zoom whiteboards will use privacy mode to anonymize sticky note content.
 - During privacy mode, sticky notes are only visible to authors (hidden to others).
 - When privacy mode ends, sticky note content will be visible to all, but authors will not be identified.

- Privacy mode ends in two ways: (1) when the whiteboard manager ends privacy mode and (2) when the Zoom session ends.
- If participants add sticky notes after privacy mode ends, that content will **not** be anonymous.
- Privacy mode only affects sticky notes. Any other objects added to the whiteboard will not be anonymized.
