Background

- Written by Cowper between 1771-2
- Cowper: Foremost poet in England from the late 18th century to early 19th century
- Struggled with bouts of depression and multiple attempts at suicide.
- This was the last of about 68 hymns Cowper wrote for the Olney Hymnal, which he worked on with John Newton. It was originally under the title: "Conflict: Light Shining out of Darkness."

I chose this hymn because in many ways Cowper's life presents the question we all face to some degree, of how we are to view the trials of our life and to respond to it. There is a famous story, although not substantiated, that he got into a cab one night intending to be taken to the bridge so that he could jump off, but there was a great fog, and they got lost, so that in the end, he found that he had been driven home. Praising God that he had been lost only to be found, he wrote this hymn.

This raises the question: **How do we respond to suffering? How are we to counsel ourselves or others when there is no earthly hope of relief and things seem relentlessly in shambles?**

*In thinking about this larger question, as I read the hymn again, **what are the actions God does, what are the actions commanded of Christians, and how are they related?** what are the actions God does, what are the actions commanded of Christians, and how are they related?*

***what are the actions God does, what are the actions commanded of Christians, and how are they related?***

Observations:

1. God's work, truth, and attributes surround the commands given to believers.
2. We take courage as a response to His goodness.
3. We do not rely on our own sight, but trust because of our knowledge of his disposition.

What is our response to seemingly relentless suffering?

1. Even when there is no visible light, Trust God  
Sight on earth is not promised, but God’s unfailing nature is.
2. God is greater than our doubts and sin; nothing escapes his design and plan, He is the interpreter of all things. Not us.
3. Do not rely on your own sight or fire. Trust in God’s even when it is invisible.

“Conflict: Light shining out of darkness”, **not** a promise that darkness will cease presently.
