In laying out her vision for USAID in November 2021, Administrator Power stated “corruption is basically development in reverse.” Corruption poses a fundamental constraint to the achievement of development and humanitarian outcomes across all sectors and the entirety of USAID’s mission. If we want to improve outcomes in health, education, the economy, peace and security, we need to address corruption head on in these sectors. Global Health has taken a lead in integrating anti-corruption into their efforts and offers a model for other sectors to learn from. In this session, we will explore new tools in tackling corruption from multiple angles and across all sectors and spotlight learning from Global Health in putting these tools into practice. This includes drilling down into efforts by USAID/Democratic Republic of Congo to establish an accountability hotline and address corruption in health supply chains. We’ll also explore findings from a new study of how USAID programming responded to corruption associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

OES is an interdisciplinary team that works across the federal government to help agencies build and use evidence. Presenters will share updates on OES' portfolio of work across the federal government on the American Rescue Plan, which was designed to address immediate needs related to the pandemic, with a specific focus on addressing historically disparate outcomes across race, class, and geography that were further exacerbated by the pandemic. They will share OES' plan for conducting a set of evaluations that are intentional and strategic in building evidence to understand the role of ARP programs and supported interventions in improving outcomes for historically underserved populations.

USAID and OES have signed an Inter-Agency Agreement that allows OES to work with USAID OUs to answer priority questions with behavioral science insights and rigorous evaluation methods using administrative data. Through the Inter-Agency Agreement, USAID has the opportunity to engage OES in similar work. Tania Alfonso will present steps required to buy into the agreement to address DEIA and other priority questions.
