Christ the King School asks each family to provide certain materials for their child for the upcoming school year. Some materials are required, while others are optional but very appreciated. As a school, we understand that all families may not be able to provide all the materials listed below. All we ask is that each family does their best to bring the required materials. Optional materials are beyond appreciated and benefit the entire classroom community but are not required.

Required Materials to Stay in the Classroom

- Nap Sack (with a stuffy if that supports your child's sleep habits).
- **Sunscreen** (labeled with your child's name).
- **Diapers and Wipes** (if the child is still in diapers).
- Pair of inside shoes (shoes that will be worn only in the classroom).
- Extra pair of clothes (uniform pants/skirt, uniform shirt, underwear, socks).

Required Materials to Bring with Your Child Everyday

- Coat (based on weather, raincoat, winter coat, or sweatshirt).




