Due to COVID-19 and the change to everyone's work schedules and ability to meet in person, we are suspending the Narrative Nonfiction Genre Study and will relaunch it in the future when appropriate.

For now, ARRT wants to focus on stress relief, community, and readers advisory. We are hosting a BYOB (Bring Your Own Book) program. Participants can bring any title they would like to share with the group (any genre, fiction/nonfiction, media, etc.). Each participant will have 90 seconds to booktalk the appeal of the book.

ARRT strongly encourages sharing diverse books, especially #ownvoices titles, so we will be practicing progressive stacking at our book chats. Titles that are written by, or reflect stories of, people from marginalized groups will be discussed first.

What we read:

The Fifth Season by N.K. Jemisin: afro-futurism, fantasy, uncertain world, skilled at world-building, gritty yet lyrical prose.

The City We Became by N.K. Jemisin: fantasy, great setting, NYC is brought to life, audiobook narration and sound effects evoke authentic setting.

-For fans of American Gods.

Wow, No Thank You by Samantha Irby: fourth collection of essays, humorous, frank, edgy/raw, very open about physical and mental health issues.

-See also: We Are Never Meeting in Real Life, for fans of Lindy West or maybe David Sedaris.

Mexican Gothic by Silvia Moreno-Garcia: gothic horror, haunted house, creepy tone and atmosphere, slow building, Mexico setting, explores themes of race and colonialism, good choice for book discussions.

-Similar to *She* by H. Rider Haggard or *Get Out*.

A Virtuous Ruby by Piper Huguley: African American historical romance/Christian fiction set in 1915, characters are very well developed, setting and details feel accurate, accessible writing style.

Well-Read Black Girl: Finding Our Stories, Discovering Ourselves by Glory Edim: essays by Black female writers about the importance of recognizing themselves in literature.

Saving Ruby King by Catherine Adel West

Take a Hint Dani Brown by Talia Hibbert: 2nd in Brown Sisters romance series, heroine wants friends w/benefits relationship with no attachments, obstacles faced by a new couple, diverse, relatable characters, humorous, frank language, difficult issues presented in a way that's not too heavy.

-Read alike for Girl Gone Viral by Alisha Rai

Relentless Moon by Mary Robinette Kowal: #3 in Lady Astronaut series, alternate history with female astronauts, addresses issues like anxiety and eating disorders

-Read alike for *Seveneves* by Neal Stephenson, *Rocket Men* by Robert Kurson, *Retrieval Artists* series by Kristine Kathryn Rusch, and *Hidden Figures*
