

Failure, however, is the main reason why many speculate the tests should not have been conducted in the first place. Statistics present that of eighty-six **genetically-altered** embryos, only seventy-one survived the process and just twenty-eight were successfully edited. To continue, twenty-eighth of the “successful embryos” did not fit the goal of the experiment; **all** twenty-eight took considerable damage to other parts of the cell and formed unintended mutations that would **undoubtedly** kill the **embryo**. Many are questioning. “Are **these** genetic studies on human embryos ethical?” Not just failure but ethics are playing a huge factor in the debate. People are seeing the ethics as the largest portion of the heat against the tests.

Blue highlighted words represent the “Parts of Speech.”

- speculate - verb
- genetically-altered - adjective
- all - indefinite pronoun
- undoubtedly - adverb
- embryo - noun
- these - demonstrative pronoun

The phrase highlighted in **purple** is an example of a subordinate word group. The subordinate group marked is an example of a *prepositional phrase*. Other groups are *verbal phrases*, *participial phrases*, *gerund phrases*, *infinitive phrases*

The two underlined sentences, one right after the other, represent two types of sentence purposes. The first underlined sentence is what is called an *interrogative* sentence. And the second underlined sentence is what is called a *declarative* sentence.

These two are of four types of sentence purposes also including, *imperative* and *exclamatory* types.
