

# English Home Language, Grade 9, Sentences

## What Are the Different Types of Sentences?

Sentences are divided into four categories: simple sentences, compound sentences, complex sentences, and compound-complex sentences.

#### Simple Sentences

Definition	A simple sentence contains one independent clause.
Examples	<ul> <li>Johnny rode his bike to school.</li> <li>Who is your best friend?</li> <li>She ate her lunch, took a walk, and went back to work.</li> </ul>

#### **Compound Sentences**

Definition	A compound sentence contains two independent clauses. A <b>coordinating conjunction</b> (for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so) often links the two independent clauses and is preceded by a comma.
Examples	<ul> <li>She wanted to go on vacation, so she saved up her money.</li> <li>I like apples, but my sister loves bananas.</li> <li>Tim loves to read, and he also loves to hike.</li> </ul>

### **Complex Sentences**

Definition	A complex sentence contains one independent clause and one or more dependent clauses. A complex sentence will include at least one <b>subordinating conjunction.</b>
Examples	<ul> <li>She went to class even though she was sick.</li> <li>As John was arriving to work, he realized he forgot his lunch.</li> <li>While I enjoy classical music, I prefer rock and roll because I play the drums.</li> </ul>

## **Compound-Complex Sentences**

Definition	<ul> <li>A compound-complex sentence combines complex sentence and compound sentence forms. A compound-complex sentence contains one or more independent clauses and one or more dependent clauses.</li> </ul>
Examples	<ul> <li>Although she felt guilty for missing her friend's birthday, she took her out to dinner the next day, and they had a great time.</li> <li>I try to eat healthy food, but because fast food is so convenient, I cannot maintain a healthy diet.</li> </ul>
	• If he got the job, he would have to commute 50 miles to work, so he decided the job was not worth it.
