Signed: March 28, 2017 [this one deals with climate change]

"The Revocation of Federal Contracting Executive Orders"

Signed: March 27, 2017 [this one deals with the rights of LGBTQ+ people]

"Ethics Commitments by Executive Branch Appointees"

Signed: Jan. 28, 2017 [this one deals with lobbyists and government hiring]

"Promoting Free Speech and Religious Liberty"

Signed: May 4, 2017 [this one deals with the division between church and state, and to some extent reproductive rights]

"Border Security and Immigration Enforcement Improvements"

Signed: Jan. 25, 2017 [this one deals with immigration and the border wall along the Mexico border]
