He checked on the guards in the truck, making sure they were OK, helped put out the fire when

the first engine arrived, checked to be sure it was fully out with a thermal imaging camera, and then worked on cleaning up the spilled coins from the roadway. Most of our calls aren't nearly that interesting, and they don't usually take four hours, but this one was unique and Bryan was right there the whole time, even making the evening newscast.

When you talk with Bryan you'll discover he's an outgoing and friendly person with an easy laugh. You'll also learn he really wants to help the community, and being a part of LPVFR lets him do that. His career goals include becoming a paramedic and finding a full time job in the fire service, but he says that if his career lets him stay local he'll continue to volunteer with us too. We hope that happens.

Bryan keeps busy, but when he has some spare time he's a snowboarder, dirt bike rider, pianist, and loves several sports. The list of things he enjoys doing is quite long, in fact, so you never quite know what else he'll be interested in.
