In Climate Diplomacy, Being Gender-Blind Leaves Women Behind (EESI 2021)

Only $\underline{38}$ out of $\underline{119}$ countries referenced sexual and reproductive health and rights in their climate commitments. Of the 38 countries who did, no countries mentioned abortion care and only one mentioned contraception. Yet climate emergencies can disrupt access to contraceptives and increase the risk of sexual violence.

Including women in the climate change conversation.
