## **COIN Legislative Session Worksheet 2025**

Brief Description of Bill: This bill would require those with an ownership interest in at least 200 acres of irrigated agricultural land to report annually to the State Department of Agriculture (ODA) the rate of fertilizer measured in pounds per acre that is applied to each field, the type of fertilizer applied, and the crop in each field.  The purpose is to gather data to be able to identify those overapplying fertilizer that results in runoff and contamination of surface water and groundwater. The DEQ would also use this information to reduce air pollution.  There would be technical assistance available to help reduce overapplication and civil penalties could apply.  It is estimated this bill would target 80% of farm land in Oregon. It does not apply to CAFO waste which is already required to be reported. And <u>testimony submitted</u> including farm owners, the Farm Bureau, and a number of farm-related associations in opposition. Even Oregonians for Food and Shelter opposed though that nonprofit has representatives of large corporations on its Board. The reasoning against the bill focused on the added burden of collecting the data and the lack of specificity in the bill as to what constitutes overapplication particularly given the variety of pesticides and crops involved. But this bill purports simply to collect data, not determine what constitutes overapplication. The first step in addressing nitrate contamination is identifying possible sources and it makes sense to find out how much fertilizer, the type and quantity, is being applied.
