


Connect to Literacy™ Family Access Logins

- The system auto-generates 4 family user IDs based on the student’s user ID
- The “Family Access” role is similar to a student’s role, but does not require a teacher to assign activities and cannot be viewed by school personnel

Where to find your Family Access logins

1. Log in to your student’s account through [Clever](#).
2. Once logged in, hover over “My Account” and select “Family Access” from the drop-down menu.



3. You will see the 4 family user IDs and auto-generated passwords. The passwords can be changed by clicking the “Edit” button.

- Expose your child to games, puzzles, and music in their home language
- Make it a habit to read books in both English and their home language with your child every day
- Encourage your child to write in their home language by creating grocery lists, writing to relatives, or making checklists
- Visit the public library regularly and keep materials in their home language in your home
