

Grade Level: 2

Subject: Reading

Short Synopsis of the Course/Subject Areas of Focus

Reading units of study in second grade are designed to introduce a range of strategies that will support and encourage lifelong readers. Second grade readers will grow their stamina and volume of reading, talk with partners. We encourage readers right from the start to reflect and think about how they can make reading this year the best it could be. Readers will adventure alongside the characters they meet in their books and recognize that stories are made up of various story elements. They will read a variety of nonfiction texts and explore the differences in the structure of nonfiction text. They will read different books on the same topic to answer questions and to deepen their understanding of a topic. Students will establish helpful reading habits, develop a sense of who they are as readers and who they want to become.

Big ideas of the unit

Trimester 1

Unit 1: Understanding Characters' Journeys and Adventures

- Readers make sure their stories always make sense when they read
- Readers build strong reading habits & stamina
- Readers share their understanding with others in a variety of ways (retell, reactions, ideas...).
- Readers recognize that stories are made up of parts (story elements) and use them to help them retell.
- Readers read and reread in a smooth voice that shows the feeling of the part of the book.

Unit 2: Reading to Learn Information

- Readers use informational book's structure and features to help them learn.
- Readers build an understanding of an informational text topic by stopping to think and jot.
- Readers use strategies to help them understand a text when it gets difficult or confusing.
- Readers share what they are learning with others.

Unit 3: Developing Ideas About Characters with a Partner

- Readers pay attention to what a character does, says, and thinks to form ideas about characters.
- Readers jot their ideas and opinions about characters and explain these ideas to their partners.
- Readers compare their ideas with their partners' ideas.
- Readers smoothly read parts of the text aloud to their partner to support their ideas and opinions.

Unit 4: Researching a Topic

- Researchers study a topic across a collection of materials starting with “starter books” into “harder books.”
- Researchers jot notes about what they are learning and organize them into categories.
- Researchers compare what they learned from book to book including facts and different points of view of different authors.
- Researchers create collections of texts and resources to study about a topic.

Trimester 3

Unit 5: Forming and Supporting Opinions About Series Books

- Readers form opinions about the characters, setting, or plot of their series books.
- Readers use writing and conversation as a tool to help them understand their series.
- Writers prove their opinions about characters with examples from the books and explanation to go with each one, often reading aloud some parts.
- Readers notice and share how their opinions change across a series of books.

Unit 6: Building Independent Reading Lives

- Readers make independent choices.
- Readers reflect on and look to strengthen their reading lives.
- Readers make summer reading plans.

Trimester 1

This unit features the use of narrative mentor texts representing people of color, and different cultures including The Name Jar and The Day You Begin. Interactive read aloud discussions centered around these mentor texts for reading will include an explicit focus on recognizing the importance of listening to every student's story, making connections to their classmates and the importance of celebrating what is unique. Each Kindness is read with a focus on treating others with kindness and empathy. Students will be able to pick high interest books from our diverse class libraries to read independently and discuss in partnerships.

Trimester 2

Books chosen by the diverse books committee for this unit include, Christian, the Hugging Lion, The Empty Pot and Pedro. Students will recount stories, including fables and folktales from diverse cultures, and determine their central message, lesson, or moral. Students will describe and discuss how characters in a story respond to major events and challenges.

Trimester 3

In this unit our students will be studying characters across a series. Students will be able to read from a variety of series that include diverse main characters including the Katie Woo Series, Jaden Toussaint Series, King and Kayla Series and the Sofia Martinez Series.
