25 March 2020:

List started, **please email me if you'd like to contribute.**

Please keep comments to the side "comments" so we can reply and keep a conversation there, thanks! I've gone ahead and done this with a few comments so we can view the document more clearly.

26 March 2020:

As the list grows, please do a quick search before adding new material, thanks! I'll go through it periodically and flag out repetitions.

I went ahead and reorganized things into sections and subsections, let me know your thoughts!

27 March 2020:

I changed the organization yet again, right now with three big themes: 1. A combo of biopolitics that perhaps also includes environment, 2. Health, 3. Othered bodies. Let me know your thoughts.

28 March 2020:

--I made a section at the end for journalistic pieces. Per the experience of Space/Race, the list can get overwhelmed pretty quickly if we add journalist pieces and web posts. I think we should be careful but flexible about this, since it's an ongoing development.

--I grouped items from various sections (Environment, Urban Planning, Isolation) into one section on Disease. I'm not sure if it should be a subsection from Health, but it seemed to me they were all more related to each other than to the sections they were in. I ordered them in subsections according to scale (Global, City, Building). This actually leaves the "environment" section empty so for now I merged them. I think we need items on environmental threats to health, I'll think about this a bit more.

--I merged "Biopolitics and Othered Bodies." So currently we have three big sections, "Disease," "Health," and "Biopolitics." Let me know your thoughts!

22 April 2020:

--I re-titled some of the categories under disease, it still seems valid to me to keep disease (as spread and containment) and health (as more preventive measures) separate, but i'd like to hear more opinions on this as clearly I'm not a specialist. Perhaps there's an established discourse/structure we could use for classification purposes?

1 May 2020:

--I divided "Biopolitics and Othered Bodies" into two sections, it seemed like it there's enough there to think of one as the more general and theoretical stance and the other as more specific in the many ways in which bodies are othered.

--edited titles to treatment/containment and health/profylaxis, what do we think of these? My instinct is that containment and prevention imply different politics and spatial strategies. Of course there's always overlap but some categories are useful for folks trying to navigate the reading list.
