In Scott Cawthon's book *Fetch*, the author chooses words carefully to make you feel scared and like bad things are going to happen. As you look at the different levels of words used below, think about how these words turn the story from a simple ghost story into a psychological thriller.

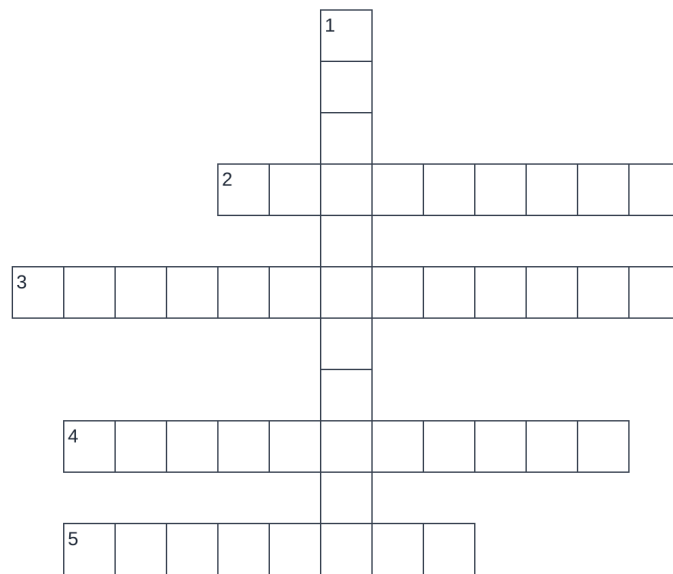
Tier 1: Basics	
<b>Synchronicity</b>	It wasn't just a coincidence. It was a meaningful connection between outer events and inner thoughts.
<b>Regret</b>	He felt a strong sense of regret in his stomach as he stared at the screen, understanding that some things can't be taken back.
Tier 2: Intermediate	
<b>Malfunction</b>	The robot's eye flickered, a machine problem that seemed too much like a human wink.
<b>Outdated</b>	The pizza place was full of old, broken machines, bad wiring, and lost hopes.
Advanced Level	
<b>Anthropomorphism</b>	Greg found it hard to see the dog as human-like; he preferred to think of it as a pet, not a trained hunter.
<b>Evil Intent</b>	The text messages arrived with a clear sense of evil—exact, chilling, and completely frightening.
