The length proportions are **±20% for the introduction** (consisting of title, abstract, reason, and contribution), a **maximum of 10% for the methodology**, a **minimum of 60% for the results and discussion**, and **±10% for the conclusions and recommendation** and references. For the **references**, the source is divided into two categories offline and online. It is highly recommended to put **20% books** and **80% the latest (no more than 5 years) online articles** published in journal databases.

### **Identify the Headings**

Headings, or heads, are organizational devices that guide the reader through your paper. There are two types: component heads and text heads.

Component heads identify the different components of your paper and are not topically subordinate to each other. Examples include ACKNOWLEDGMENTS and REFERENCES, and for these, the correct style to use is "Heading 5." Use "figure caption" for your Figure captions, and "table head" for your table title. Run-in heads, such as "Abstract," will require you to apply a style (in this case, italic) in addition to the style provided by the drop-down menu to differentiate the head from the text.

Text heads organize the topics on a relational, hierarchical basis. For example, the paper title is the primary text head because all subsequent material relates and elaborates on this one topic. If there are two or more sub-topics, the next level head (uppercase Roman numerals) should be used and, conversely, if there are not at least two sub-topics, then no subheads should be introduced. Styles named "Heading 1," "Heading 2," "Heading 3," and "Heading 4" are prescribed.

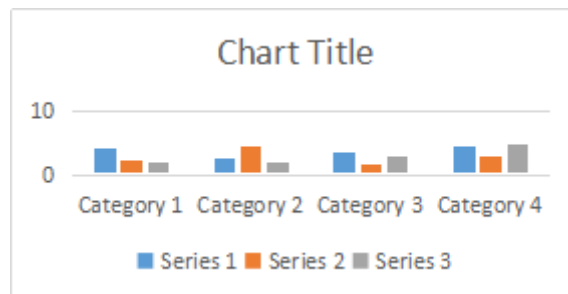


Figure 1. The Example of Figure
