Foreword from Greener Practice Directors

With this updated snapshot of the ground-breaking work being done by the primary care Integrated Care Board (ICB) Net Zero and Climate Emergency teams across England, we see a clearer picture of what best practice might look like for all ICBs. It is uplifting to read that over the last year such tangible progress has been made where such teams have been created, there's a great deal to celebrate!

However, to the best of our knowledge and in the absence of collated information from Greener NHS, this is an incomplete jigsaw. The majority of ICBs do not yet prioritise primary care in their Green Plans. We hope that by reading about successes in other parts of the country, many more ICBs will be encouraged to create clinically lead primary care Net Zero and Climate Emergency teams to initiate action as part of their Green Plan Refresh in 2025.

On behalf of all members of the Greener Practice network, we sincerely thank Grace Ridler and Dr Emma Radcliffe for their deep commitment and great tenacity chairing Greener Practice ICB Primary Care Net Zero Leads groups over recent years. Through attending the monthly meetings, those who lead (or are interested in leading) primary care's drive to Net Zero have built relationships, shared learning and expanded networks. 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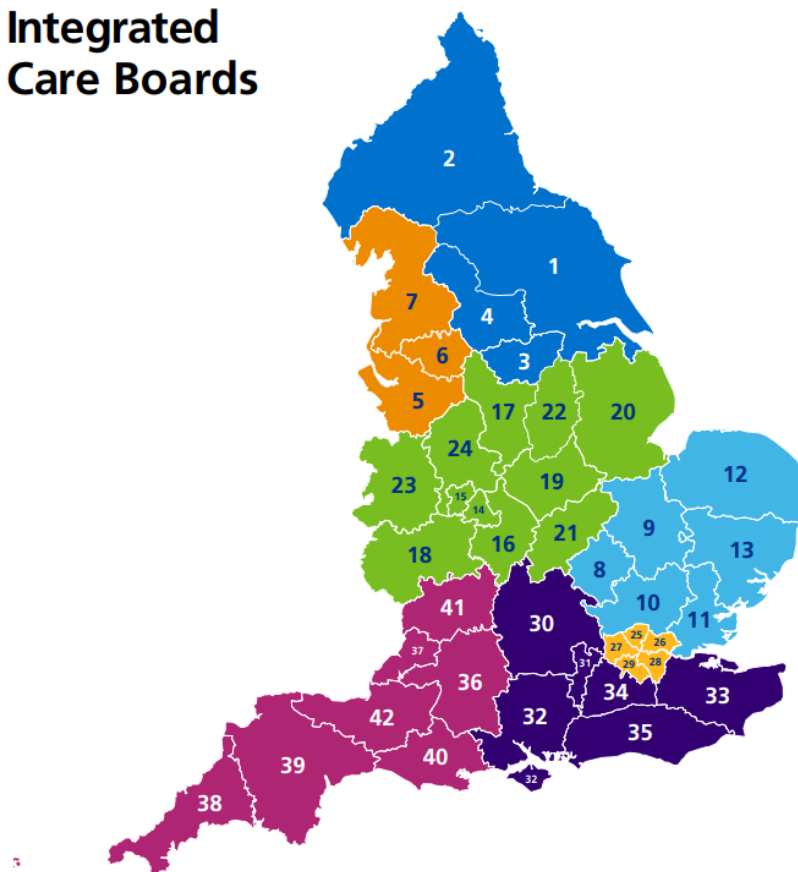

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CASE STUDY:

Title

Greener Dental Practice

What was the problem?

From April 2023 ICSs became responsible for commissioning primary care. We wanted to promote sustainable healthcare across our system and enable all colleagues to reduce their carbon footprint.

We reviewed what support and activity was already underway across Primary Care to guide them on how they could support the journey to Net Zero. We identified that many GP Practices were making use of Greener Practice and the Green Impact tool but that the offering for other parts of Primary Care was minimal. We were keen to ensure parity of approach across Primary Care but had limited capacity, so we chose to focus on dentistry because we had data on the carbon footprint and interest from key stakeholders as a result of previous activity in our region going back to 2017.

The carbon footprint of the NHS dental service is 675 kilotonnes carbon dioxide equivalents (CO₂e). Examinations contributed the highest proportion to this footprint (27.1%) followed by scale and polish (13.4%) and amalgam/composite restorations (19.3%). From an emissions perspective, nearly 2/3 (64.5%) of emissions related to travel (staff and patient travel), 19% procurement (the products and services dental clinics buy) and 15.3% related to energy use. (B. Duane, 2017)

What was the solution?

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough ICS led a HFAF bid, to relaunch a behaviour change tool, which would be free to access by all dental practices in England. This toolkit is designed to provide practical advice and tips to general practices across the UK, that want to improve their sustainability'

The East of England had run a successful pilot, on the back of research by PHE on the carbon footprint of dentistry. However, COVID affected momentum. The HFAF funding allowed us to update, revamp and relaunch the Green Impact Dentistry toolkit across England.

We established a steering group of NHS Regional and ICS colleagues, a leading academic in Dental sustainability, a Local Dental Network Chair, sustainability fellows and a clinical policy manager from the Office of Chief Dental Officer England, as well

as Students Organization Sustainability UK, (a charitable subsidiary of National Union for Students which developed and manages the Green Impact toolkit). We set up an engagement panel of stakeholders from across the sector to inform direction of travel. We created communications and guidance and disseminated this to key stakeholders.

Student-led audits of participating dental practices will commence in Autumn 2023. These will verify progress and gather feedback, before presenting awards to successful practices.

What were the challenges?

The first challenge was updating the content of the tool. This project relies on the time of volunteers and enthusiasts. Finding time around the day job to meet the tight timescale was a challenge but we wanted to ensure the best possible clinical and professional input into the product and valued this breath of input into the content and adaptation to make the tool more user friendly. We worked through contacts on our Steering Group and convened an Engagement Panel of experts and 'in the field' professionals to test, inform and refine the product, before it was finally launched.

Getting practices to sign up was the second challenge. We worked through professional bodies and associations, to spread the word, explain the concept and provide support. We will continue to work to raise the profile across teaching bodies and professional and membership organisations. The aim is to reach as many in this field as possible within and working with, the NHS and dentistry as a whole.

The third challenge is maintaining momentum of engagement in the absence of a long-term funding plan. We are currently only able to confirm funding until the end of December 2023.

What were the results/impact?

As of October 2023, 140 dental teams have registered on the Dentistry toolkit and are working towards an award. These practices have so far implemented 1,500 positive sustainability actions through the programme.

We are particularly delighted by the engagement of our Community Dental Service, whose experience is recorded below:

"The dental teams decided to aim for a bronze award, we felt this was achievable given the added workload onto already busy days. I worked with the senior nurses to

pick actions that were most in line with our Trust's Green Plan and that staff felt most passionately about. This helped create ownership and a sense of achievement.

With various clinics and sites, we agreed each team had to pick what best suited their location and service provision. Our teams are really enjoying working through the toolkit, it has generated good conversations and changes within our organisation as well a bit of healthy competition. We hope to take part again next year and aim for silver or gold. Now that we have a plan of how the teams work, if we take part next year, we will be ready to go straight away." What were the learning points?

The success of this project is due to the dedication, enthusiasm and commitment of the Steering Group.

The strength of the toolkit is that is underpinned by academic research and content and functionality shaped by sustainability and dental professionals.

The strength of the toolkit is it developed by the sector for the sector. Students are trained as assessors and this provides a meaningful work experience for undergraduates, external validation of progress and supports this low-cost model.

Working at national level is key to getting the message out there and gaining the trust and respect of the professionals in the field. Utilizing various channels of promotion from The Office of the Chief Dental Officer, CQC and Dental events.

Linking this to other related work of the Steering Group e.g. supported engagement e.g. the development of Clinical Guidelines for environmental sustainability in dentistry <https://www.sustainablegreendentistry.com>.

We can learn from others' experience. Public Health Wales has made a similar tool available to all its dental practices since 2022. We looked also at systems in Scotland and how interaction with the private sector and larger dental consortia worked to engage professionals and patients and grow understanding of the potential for change in this field.

Next steps

The initial bid was for 'pump-prime' funding to embed innovation which would then become financially self-sustainable or fully integrated into business-as-usual. The pilot has tested and gathered evidence to support a business case with the intent to request recurrent funding, implementation or onward commissioning. The pilot aims to gather evidence on the effectiveness of an innovative product/service which would

then be available for individual or provider purchase/use (for example to citizens, GP Practices, Care Homes, Schools, Pharmacies etc).

Given the success to date we are really keen to mainstream this tool and give it the longevity it is afforded in Wales and on a footing similar to the GP Green Tool operating across England. There is huge potential too, to expand to other disciplines such as optometry, pharmacy and other AHPs. The link towards helping ICSs monitor delivery and show traction with our Green Plans is huge, facilitating reporting and making it more transparent.

We will continue to work with professional bodies and national teams to raise the profile and success of tools like this and show the impact for delivery of sustainable care pathways across the NHS.

- Central Liverpool PCN level sustainability lead (pilot) by Dr Nadja van Ginneken, (paid 1 session per month since December 2023 for 1 year initially).
 - Deprescribing project with network pharmacists: focus of deprescribing brought into SMR reviews for those on > 10 repeat meds (due to have results in August 2024)
 - Air quality project with geography students: assessing air pollution around Central Liverpool PCN (CLPCN), and estimating air quality impacts of tree screens in most polluted areas (due to have results September 2024).

Achievements:

- Continued promotion of [10-step plan to Greener Primary Care](#) (adapted from Cheshire & Merseyside 10 point plan).
- GP Practice energy reduction project completed in Salford Locality, report available with lessons learned & top tips. ((link to be added)) Average annual cost & carbon savings of £4,400 and 7,510kgCO₂e. Next steps are to include learning from report in the System Primary Care Estates approach.
- Completion of Healthier Futures Action Fund 2022 project to develop and roll out a pilot for incentivised Primary Care travel survey & travel plan creation; the Healthier Greener Travel toolkit. Opportunity promoted for providers to participate and have the opportunity to bid for funding to support interventions. 110 providers registered interest, and 40 providers participated in the travel surveys; 2,057 patient responses and 204 staff responses received. Survey results shared with TfGM for insights. 8 providers (all GP) submitted completed toolkits and received financial incentives. 5 providers submitted successful bids for sustainable travel interventions including purchase of e-bikes, cycle shelters, and repairing shower facilities. Healthier Greener Travel toolkit currently under review following feedback, for wider release in 2024.
- Short Guide to Cycle to Work Schemes ((link to be added)) created (adapted from Cheshire & Merseyside guide).

- NHS Guide to Installing Solar Power ((link to be added)) developed with Greater Manchester Combined Authority to provide information and signposting for providers considering installing solar power, including cost modelling.
- Average carbon footprint per inhaler reduced from 13.16kgCO₂e in April 2023 to 12.95kgCO₂e in April 2024. Switch prompt for generic salbutamol & Ventolin inhalers to Salamol has been approved through medicines optimisation governance, to be rolled out with an updated greener inhaler communications campaign. Low carbon inhaler dashboard in use for GM monitoring and promoted to GP practices and trusts to enable accurate monitoring.
- Introductory sustainability training videos are currently being developed with Greater Manchester Training Hub for their Introduction to Primary Care course (due to launch October 2024), with plans for a further high quality low carbon asthma care training module.
- Sustainability KPI included in Salford locality locally commissioned service scheme focusing on action in practices and high quality low carbon asthma care. General Practice Sustainability Advocate Forum created in pilot approach, for consideration for roll-out in the other 9 Greater Manchester localities.

Achievements:

- Clinical Lead recruited 1 session/ week from February 24. Has trained over 100 trainee GPs. Trainees are encouraged to undertake a final year project around environmental sustainability.
- Series of 6 lunchtime webinars for Great Big Green week. Recorded and now available on our Greener ICB internet site [here](#). An average of 30 staff attended each session.
- New Greener Practice Lancashire & Cumbria Group has been approved June 24. 43 members on primary care Greener WhatsApp Group. 16% of our practices have nominated Green lead.
- 29 GP practices signed up to Destination Net Zero programme which provides free audit, carbon reduction plan and funding advice. 23 have already received their audit from the Chamber of Commerce. This is now being offered to other areas within primary care with half day in-person workshops scheduled for July and September to share learning.

- Active Travel Lancashire has enabled 9 GP practices to improve their cycling infrastructure, 2 of which now use electric bikes for patient visits, further funding has recently been released and is currently being applied for.
- Environmental Sustainability at Regional Nursing and AHP Conference and Digital Town Hall. A staff member from all 275 practices has received an introduction to the Green Plan, usually via practice manager forums.
- Medicines Management team hosted a drop in session for practices to support sustainable medicines. Checklist is on the primary care area of the Greener ICB site [here](#)
- ICB decarbonisation bid to SALIX for £2m on behalf of CHP primary care buildings (Darwin and Yarnspinnings) has been successful. This will be rolled out over the next 2 years.
- NuGreen granular waste audits within 4 GP practices, summary report is expected shortly.

Inhaler switches. An integrated programme which was awarded Presqip winners in Sustainability in 2022 has continued.

- Forming an ICB working group with leads from Sustainability, respiratory, transformation, GPs and LPC
- Ensured Low Carbon inhaler Option at every step at asthma and COPD guidelines.
- High and Low carbon symbols on all inhalers on guidelines for easy identification
- Information around appropriate inhaler disposal

- Using community pharmacy New Medicine Service to support inhaler switching.
- Training sessions on low carbon inhalers
- Patient focused communications
- Resources in practices to support with low carbon inhalers.

Project continues to focus on patient communications, staff training, appropriate prescribing scheme and innovations such as ***Improving asthma care through implementation of the SENTINEL programme***. Key findings from the pilot site included SABA prescribing reduced in North Colchester PCN at the end of the 12-month pilot compared to before launch. Patient feedback was positive about switching to MART inhaler from the engagement workshops.

Medicines waste project. Has been initiated with LPC, Primary Care and ICB Medicines Management Team. A phased programme is being developed to have system wide approach to advise patients and healthcare practitioners on reducing medicine waste and safe disposal.

Health innovations work included trialling cold chain solutions within refrigerators to reduce medicines waste at three general practices. [Improving cold chain with BioPCM®- platform based Apollo™ Smart Panels - Health Innovation East](#)

Primary care digital records. Over 50,000 primary care paper records digitised plus securely and sustainably destroyed.

System wide digital carbon challenge. Collation of best practice and digital interventions alongside behaviour change programmes to reduce electricity usage.

Air quality and activities to reduce air pollution. In partnership with SCC Public Health working with general practices and patient groups. Engagement to listen to patients and residents' lived experience of the impacts of air pollution on health. Training to nurses on the impacts of damp and mould on health and interventions that be made. The work is informing our approach on how best to support primary care and patients. **Indoor air quality pilot project** on signposting warm homes team to improve housing conditions that also reduce carbon of the patient's home and the care pathways through less travel, hospital admissions and prescribed medicines.

Fuel Poverty workshop training. Through our role in Charing the Essex Climate Anchors Working Group (in partnership with system partners, Essex County Council and Citizens Advice Bureau) 546 individuals in front line services received training in Essex in 22/23.

Gloves off project. ICB Nursing team has led the system partners on developing gloves use reduction project to reduce our single use plastic consumption, this is also being rolled out to care homes and GP surgeries. Training sessions, marketing materials and mentoring is provided. Five general practices currently onboarded.

Social Value in procurement inclusion on procurement (LES) contract seeking to add value through the social value model and reducing carbon emissions.

Community Gardens in general practices

North East Essex Alliance. Kennedy Way Medical Centre, Clacton on Sea in partnership with NHS Property Services and Abbeyfield Medical Centre, Colchester. Have created community gardens within their Practices. Working with VCFSE organisations to plant areas and create safe spaces. These include raised beds, men shed and the addition of a wildlife pond (both Kennedy Way). The spaces are used by social prescribers, care homes for dementia patients (Abbeyfields) and a variety of community groups including veteran support schemes utilising the green space for preventative and rehabilitative activity. The areas also act as a focus for individuals and communities to visit to combat loneliness. More sites are earmarked for development to expand the green spaces concept across SNEE.

Green & social prescribing

Nature based prescribing introduced in West Suffolk Alliance with RSPB

RSPB Nature Prescriptions are a guided conversation between a healthcare professional and their client supported by tailored materials with the aim of strengthening a person's connection to nature to benefit their wellbeing. Nature Prescriptions are designed as prompts for people to bring nature into their everyday lives, wherever they live. There is no need to travel or join groups, and they are free for the recipient to use. Following a successful pilot in Primary Care in 2020/21, RSPB Nature Prescriptions are being delivered across England and recently RSPB secured funding from external partners to deliver a Nature Prescriptions project with healthcare professionals in West Suffolk. It is early days for the project but planning is underway with the next step being to pull together Social Prescribing Link Workers from across the Alliance.

The Food museum project is called the “outdoor wellbeing experience”.

It offers a place where people can be supported and benefit from natural settings. Participants are supported through green therapies such as conservation and food-based activities:

- Gardening and planting in the walled garden area
- Work with the bird of prey release programme
- Laying of hedges
- Learning plant/animal identification
- Participants can choose their interest and develop skills in that area

The aim of the project is to enable people to feel more connected and confident in their communities through participation in the 10 week programme and take part in 2 sessions per week. They then go on to be volunteers within the museum and can be mentors for the next programme. It has been excellent for its sustainable support and ongoing opportunities for participants. Participants have seen an average increase in their personal wellbeing scores of 25%.

Greenlight Trust

Greenlight Trust has worked closely with Suffolk PCNS and Alliances to develop a programme that supports patients with complex needs and support. Using nature and woodland settings as a conduit for therapy and support. Benefits of the Greenlight Trust partnership include patient wellbeing scores improving, average reduction of 10 GP visits per patient per annum and benefit to public service of £1.71 to every £1 invested. Active travel, walking and cycling prescriptions

Successful joint funding social prescribing active travel bid attracting £1.4m investment to Suffolk County Council to encourage walking, cycling to improve health and climate outcomes. [Active travel social prescribing pilots: local authority allocations - GOV.UK \(www.gov.uk\)](#)

The scheme is in year two and the ICB, General practice, University of Suffolk and Suffolk County Council are working in partnership to this integrated project.

In North East Essex the Alliance continues to work closely with Active Essex and VCFSE partners to improve walking and cycling through our social prescribers and general practices

Dental Healthcare Suffolk

Dental Healthcare Suffolk part of Cambridgeshire Community Services NHS Trust delivered a SusQi project on the reduction of single use plastics in dental procedures making potential savings of 33168 kg of CO₂e, 75.8kg clinical waste and £1085.44, if rolled out over all 8 dental clinics service wide. Dental Healthcare Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough all won a bronze award for working through the Green Impact for Dentistry Toolkit and are working towards a silver award for 2024.

- Monthly SEL ICS Sustainability Network bulletins being cascaded to Green champions, key stakeholders involved in the ICS Green Plan and within ICB. Bi-monthly primary care sustainability meetings are held virtually to engage SEL staff with the SEL ICS Green Plan and provide feedback.
- Brockwell Park Surgery Herne Hill, Lambeth borough has a practice garden designed to offer a therapeutic and participatory outdoor environment to their patients. The garden is divided into areas for fruit, vegetables, herbs, woodland plants, and flower borders. Clinical staff can refer patients for social therapeutic horticulture sessions, which take place via the practice garden group. In 2020, the GP practice was the winner of a Blooming Lambeth Award in the category of Community Food Growing.
- Blackfriars Medical Centre and Elm Lodge GP practices undertook the Mayor's Business Climate Challenge which is an energy efficiency programme that provides no-cost support to private businesses to make their workplaces more energy efficient, reduce energy costs and support businesses on their pathway to zero carbon.

- Completion of two primary care focussed active travel projects:
 - Partnering with Cyclepods, successful installation of 60 high-security cycle storage pods across the General Practice estate
 - Partnering with the active travel charity Sustrans, successful delivery of a programme of education around cycling, walking and wheeling (including the provision of pool bikes) in PCNs across Lambeth, Bexley and Bromley.

- **Inhaler switch** - Nov 23 data shows 45% reduction in Ventolin prescribing - estimated carbon footprint savings 730,000 kg Co2e. Patient experience videos created and promoted demonstrating benefits of switching from MDI to DPI. As of Feb 24, 75 practice reviews now complete. 3700 patients reviewed, 2500 stopped salbutamol inhalers, and increase from 27% to 73% of patients using DPI rather than MDI.

Somerset ICB have supported the **development of the Somerset Greener Practice Network (SGPN)**, this has been led by the Sustainability Team at Frome Medical Practice. The team have reached out to all practices across Somerset to understand the level of engagement there has been with sustainability up to now.

The team then launched **Bronze Now sessions to support practices to use the Green Impact for Health Toolkit**. To date over a third of practices have attended the sessions and it is hoped all these practices will achieve at least Bronze Award level. The sessions have also acted as 'protected time' for practices to work on their own green plans.

It was recognised that having a way to connect with other practices was key, so the team have **developed a Mighty Network space for Somerset practices to get on demand support for the Green Impact for Health Toolkit**. It is also a place for others outside Somerset and/or primary care to engage with the work happening in the county.

Along with Frome Medical Practice and RCGP - Severn deanery, **Somerset ICB co-hosted the Green Impact for Health conference - *Working towards a wellbeing economy***. The conference took place in July at Frome Medical Centre and focussed on the work done in Frome and beyond. Delegates came from across the country to focus on the environmental sustainability agenda and discuss ways to move focus to health creation.

Funded by NHS England, the project consisted of two strands. One that focused on Social Value in Digital Procurement, the other on Carbon Risk Tooling.

Procurement Guidance produced by NHSE was tested across the ICS partnership (local authority, Trust and ICB). Some important learning came out of this, including the need to allow appropriate timescales for wider stakeholder engagement to understand what the market can deliver in terms of social value, what environmental opportunities might look like and how the procurement can better support the voluntary sector. The 10% weighting as driven by PPN 06/21 can often be wasted due to short timescales to deliver the procurement, and a disconnect between the commissioning authority objectives and the local community objectives. There is real opportunity here to deliver meaningful outcomes to our population through effective collaborative working.

Another key outcome from the project was the commencement of the two-year pilot programme testing 'Loop', a social value monitoring and measuring tool.

The carbon risk tooling included testing tooling produced by NHS England, and other climate risk tools that are available. The question around whether it's appropriate for risk management and analysis should sit with Sustainability or with EPRR has been discussed frequently. There is also a shared concern that there are many different toolkits being used. Key outcomes from the project included a consistent approach to planning and guidance – not reinventing the wheel. A robust approach to redundant data is imperative. The electricity required to store around 3,500 emails (of 5MB each) produces as much CO₂ as driving a car over half a mile, and the importance of working with EPRR around developing robust mitigations and strengthening risk management to include broader risk around climate change, with particular focus on primary care.

NHS Somerset ICS 'Show me your meds, please'

NHS Somerset Foundation Trust (SFT) project funded by SBRI and led by Dr. Deborah Gompertz from SFT

'Show me your meds please' is a new model of care asking a simple screening question, during routine home visits by community staff, and provides the potential for massive reduction in medicines waste with subsequent environmental and cost saving benefits, along with improved individualised patient care. This campaign is being rolled out across primary and secondary care in Somerset and includes a package of training support around how to have meaningful conversations with patients regarding their medicines.

NHS Somerset ICB 'Gloves Off!' Campaign

Collaborative project across sustainability and Infection prevention and control. Led by Christine Young, Sustainability Manager and Lucy Champion, IPC Quality Improvement Nurse.

Disposable gloves are one of the biggest environmental hotspots, with 1.4 billion gloves being used across the NHS each year. Despite this usage there are many circumstances where glove use is unnecessary. Somerset ICB is on a mission to encourage healthcare professionals to reduce unnecessary use of non-sterile gloves. Using gloves when they're not needed not only contributes to environmental damage, but it also disrupts good hand hygiene practice.

Our 'Gloves Off' campaign ran in conjunction with National Hand Hygiene Day (05 May 2024) from 29 April – 12 May 2024. The campaign was rolled out across primary care and our care homes, and received some great engagement. This is part of a wider sustainability and IPC campaign that will continue throughout the year focusing on various initiatives that reduce our environmental impact.
