Executive Summary

This memo summarizes the applicant pool and invitations for the 2023-24 Exam Schools Admission year. In June 2023, a more comprehensive review of the exam schools admissions process will be presented to the School Committee. This memo examines the applicant pool, invitations for each exam school, as well as the use of additional points and student ranking.

Grade 7

- Invitations: 1,000 invitations were distributed, which is the same number of invitations that were sent out in SY22-23. 74% of eligible applicants received an invitation to an exam school. Overall, 63% of applicants received an invitation to their first-choice school, 10% to their 2nd choice school, 1% to their third-choice school, and 26% did not receive an invitation.
- **Tiers:** Students from every socioeconomic tier received an invitation to each exam school, with each tier receiving between 7% and 18% of available seats at each school, based on student preference.
- Student Groups: Groups that received higher percentages of invitations in SY22-23 continued to receive similar percentages of invitations in SY23-24, including students experiencing homelessness, in the care of DCF, and living in BHA housing (8%); economically disadvantaged students (49%); English learners (6%); and students with disabilities (6%). Approximately 75% of invitations went to students of color, consistent with the percentage in SY22-23 invitations.
- Additional Points: Students in every tier received an invitation to each school based on individual student
 preferences. The percentage of students in each tier who were invited and received additional points ranged from
 34% in tier 8 to 96% in tier 1. Overall, 72% of students invited received either 10 or 15 additional points on their
 composite score.

Grade 9

- Invitations: 480 invitations were distributed, an increase of 56 invitations from SY22-23. 54% of eligible applicants received an invitation to an exam school. Overall, 31% received an invitation to their first-choice school, 18% to their second-choice school, 13% to their third-choice school, and 46% did not receive an invitation.
- **Tiers:** Students from every socioeconomic tier received an invitation to each exam school, with each tier receiving between 7% and 17% of available seats at each school, based on student preference.
- Student Groups: Groups that received higher percentages of invitations in SY22-23 continued to receive similar percentages of invitations in SY23-24, including students experiencing homelessness, in the care of DCF, and living in BHA housing (12%); economically disadvantaged students (54%); English learners (6%); and students with disabilities (5%). Approximately 85% of invitations went to students of color, an decrease of 4 percentage points from SY22-23 invitations.
- Additional Points: Students in every tier received an invitation to each school based on individual student preferences. The percentage of students in each tier who were invited and received additional points ranged from 28% in tier 8 to 94% in tier 2. Overall, 81% of students invited received either 10 or 15 additional points on their composite score.

Applicant Pool

To be eligible for exam school consideration, a student needed to have a B or higher GPA, have a valid MAP test score, and have ranked at least one exam school. This was the third year requiring a B GPA, the second year of adding Science and Social Studies to the GPA used in exam school admissions, and the first year using test scores as 30% of the composite score calculated for each student.

Of eligible grade 7 applicants, 65% of students received 10 additional points based on their prior-year school, and 7% of students received 15 points because they are experiencing homelessness, in the care of the Department of Children and Families or are living in housing owned by the Boston Housing Authority. Students in every tier received either 10 or 15 points. Of eligible grade 9 applicants, 68% of students received 10 additional points, and 9% received 15 additional points. Overall, the percentages of students who received the points among grade 7 or 9 applicants remained consistent in SY23-24.

7th Grade Invitations

In 7th grade, 1,000 invitations were sent for SY23-24, this was the same number of invitations as was sent out in SY22-23. Additionally, as implemented during the SY22-23 admissions cycle, each school will maintain a waitlist of up to 100 students until November 30, 2023.

74% of eligible applicants received an invitation to an exam school, with 63% receiving an invitation to their first choice school, 10% to their 2nd choice school, 1% to their third choice school and 26% not receiving an invitation.

In order to distribute invitations, students are assigned to a socioeconomic tier based on the census tract in which they reside. Census tracts are grouped into equally-sized tiers based on socioeconomic factors from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey. The policy seeks to assign invites evenly across the 8 tiers. With 1,000 Grade 7 invites, the policy thus seeks to assign 125 invites per tier. While the tiers are designed to have the same number of children in grades 5-8 living in each tier, eligible applicants were not equally distributed across tiers. For instance, there were 111 eligible applicants from Tier 3 as compared to 272 from Tier 8. Invitations that were not distributed in tiers without enough eligible applicants (less than 125) were re-distributed to tiers with remaining applicants in an 11th and 12th round in order to distribute 1,000 invitations. Students in every tier received an invitation to each school, based on individual student preferences. The percentage of students in each tier who were invited and received points ranged from 34% in tier 8 to 96% in tier 1. Overall, 72% of students invited received either 10 or 15 additional points on their composite score.

Compared to SY22-23, the percentage of students receiving invitations in individual zip codes increased in some zip codes (Longwood/Fenway 02115 +1.3; Dorchester 02121 +1.9;) and decreased in other zip codes (Roxbury 02119 -4.1; Dorchester 02125 -1.4; South Boston 02127 -1.3; Roslindale 02131 -1.6;). This fluctuation is expected each year based on the number of qualified applicants and their rank choices.

Approximately 75% of invitations went to students of color, consistent with the rate for the SY22-23 invitations. The percentage of Asian (-3), Black (-2), and Latinx (+3) students receiving invitations increased from SY21-22, while the percentage of White students receiving an invitation decreased by 1 percentage point from the previous year.

The racial breakdown of the incoming class at each exam school has changed over the last four admissions cycles, with the largest consistent increase for Latinx students whose representation has risen to 34% at Boston Latin Academy, 20% at Boston Latin School, and 41% at John D. O'Bryant.

9th Grade Invitations

In 9th grade, 480 invitations were sent for SY23-24 admissions, an increase of 56 invitations from SY22-23. The increase in invitations is primarily due to an increase in the number of invitations to Boston Latin School and the O'Bryant School. Similar to the SY22-23 admissions cycle, each school will maintain a waitlist of up to 100 students until November 30, 2023.

Students are assigned to a socioeconomic tier based on the census tract in which they reside. The policy seeks to assign invites evenly across the 8 tiers. With 480 Grade 9 invites, the policy seeks to assign 53 invites per tier. Students in every tier received an invitation to each school, based on individual student preferences. The percentage of students in each tier who were invited and received points ranged from 28% in tier 8 to 94% in tier 2. Overall, 77% of students invited received either 10 or 15 additional points on their composite score.
