FRENCH at GORHAM MIDDLE SCHOOL

Course Description:

Students at Gorham Middle School have the opportunity to learn French in 7th and 8th grade. Our 7th grade rotation is 7 weeks long and our 8th grade rotation is 9 weeks (one quarter).

French focuses on communication through reading, writing, listening and speaking in French, as well as learning about cultures from a variety of French-speaking countries. In this course, we will learn through interactive and collaborative work in large and small groups as well as individually. Content ranges from the very basics (weather/date) to expressing preferences and talking about oneself. The content studied in this course will be connected to real world applications.

Our hope is to inspire an interest in language learning and culture while creating a safe and welcoming environment in which students can learn.

Learning Outcomes:

- Find connections and comparisons between a student's first language and French.
- Understand and interpret written language found in a variety of printed materials.
- Present written information about themselves and others.
- Compare the cultures of French speakers with one's own.

Course Materials & Books:

Students will use both teacher created and online resources.

Weekly lessons, materials and resources can be found in our Google classroom.

Assessment:

Students are assessed in the modes of interpretive and presentational communication. There are formative as well as summative assessments throughout the rotation.

Grading Criteria:

For the World Language course grade, students are assessed with rubrics made available to them ahead of the assessment.

Skills for Life grading will report separately from all other Standards.

ATTENDANCE POLICY
