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1. INTRODUCTION □ Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt

In general, the introductory section contains background, situation analysis, partner problems, problem formulation, activity objectives, problem solutions and literature review. Writers are required to express quantitatively the portrait, profile and condition of the target audience involved in community service activities. It can also describe the condition and potential of the area in terms of physical, social, economic and environmental aspects that are relevant to the activities carried out. Also describe the potential that is used as material for community service activities. The author is asked to formulate the problem concretely and clearly in this section. Explain the goals to be achieved in service activities.

This section is supported by a literature review which is used as a support for the concept of service. Authors are required to present primary literature reviews (references to journal articles and conference proceedings) and up-to-date (references published within the last 10 years). Literature review is not limited to theory, but also empirical evidence. Enrich this introductory section with the efforts that have been made by other parties. This article is the result of service which is a downstream of research results, which can be the results of your own research or other researchers.

2. METHOD □ Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt

In the implementation method section, describe clearly and concisely the methods used to achieve the goals set out in the service activities. The results of the dedication must be measurable and the writer was asked to explain the measuring instrument used, both descriptively and qualitatively. Explain how to measure the level of achievement of the success of community service activities. The level of achievement can be seen from the attitude, socio-cultural and economic changes of the target community.

3. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION □ Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt

Community service is an effort to disseminate science, technology and art to society. These activities must be able to provide added value to society, both in economic activities, policies and behavioral (social) changes. Explain that service activities have been able to provide change for individuals/society and institutions, both short and long term.

In this section, describe how the activities are carried out to achieve the goal. Explain the indicators for achieving goals and the benchmarks used to declare the success of the service activities that have been carried out. Reveal the advantages and disadvantages of the output or main focus of the activity if you see its suitability to the conditions of the community at the location of the activity. Also explain the level of difficulty in implementing activities and producing goods and opportunities for future development. Articles can be strengthened with relevant documentation regarding services or goods as outputs, or the main focus of activities. Documentation can be in the form of images of the implementation or implementation process, product prototype images, tables, graphs, and so on.

Tables and Figures □ Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt

Tables and figures are part of the manuscript and cannot be separated from the body of the manuscript. Place tables and figures where appropriate to the narrative so they complete the narrative. Tables and figures are numbered sequentially based on the order they appear in the text. Tables and figures must be given a title. These numbers are followed by the table title and figure. After and before the images and tables, 1 row of space is given. The table display can be seen in Table 1.

Images included in the manuscript must be of good quality. Images do not stand alone and must be a relevant part of the manuscript. Please note that images are not documentation that is not related to the discussion of the manuscript. Make sure the manuscript does not display images that reveal the identity or affiliation of the authors.

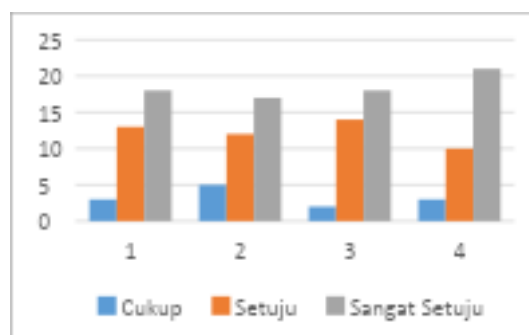


Figure 3. Questionnaire Results

The conclusion must clearly indicate the results obtained, their advantages and disadvantages, as well as possible further developments. The conclusion should be in the form of a paragraph, not in the form of points.

BIBLIOGRAPHY □ Times New Roman, Bold, 11 pt

Writing a bibliography using the IEEE format in the order according to the order of citations in the manuscript of the paper. References written in the previous bibliography must have been referred to in the manuscript, written sequentially. It is recommended to use tools such as Mendeley, Zotero and other reference management tools.
