Serial, monograph: important considerations (and not necessarily straightforward; two zine catalogers might not do it the same way).

- One person talked about looking for copy and if they find serial they use that (making notes locally as applicable), but if no serial copy, treats as mono.
- Rhonda showed us Connecticunt cataloged as serial; another HarCo zine, which is serial in nature, but Rhonda catalogs as mono because contents vary from issue to issue (but made a series to connect all the issues together; a local series)

Each institution is inevitably going to apply the standards in slightly different ways.

Use of language in description: "pedestrian" vs. "fancy". Discussed needs for both. To make zines discoverable in their own language, but also make them discoverable on same terms as other materials in a big, diverse collection (if that's your context).
