The midterm exam will be a series of written essays taken from a pool of possible questions given in advance.

For the Mini Reports research any one of the major psychologists that have had an impact on the history of psychology. Spend 1 hour researching the person's life, history and impact on psychology and then summarize your findings in 2 pages or less.

The poster project will be discussed and worked on in a group, then produced as a group. The project will involve an investigation into any one of the major branches/systems of psychology.

The project poster presentation will also be discussed and worked on in a group and presented as a group with participation from all members. You will also be expected to view and comment on other students posters. Details will be advised.

The final exam will be in a similar format as the midterm but will cover the entire course. Questions will be taken from a pool of possible questions given in advance.
