Purpose

By zooming in on the stories of women in specific societies, we can better understand the challenges women faced throughout history and, in many parts of the world, continue to face today. Through comparing the experiences of women across different regions and time periods, we can see how societies constructed the roles and status of women within them, and perhaps learn to question the ways in which women's roles are defined today.

Process

- 1. Read "Medieval Women in Western Europe, c. 1000–1350 CE" and "Women in the Song Dynasty of China, 960–1279 CE." (Note: Your teacher might have you read just one article, and then ask you to work with a partner who has read the other.)
- 2. Working alone or with your partner, use the information in these articles to complete the Comparison Tool below.
