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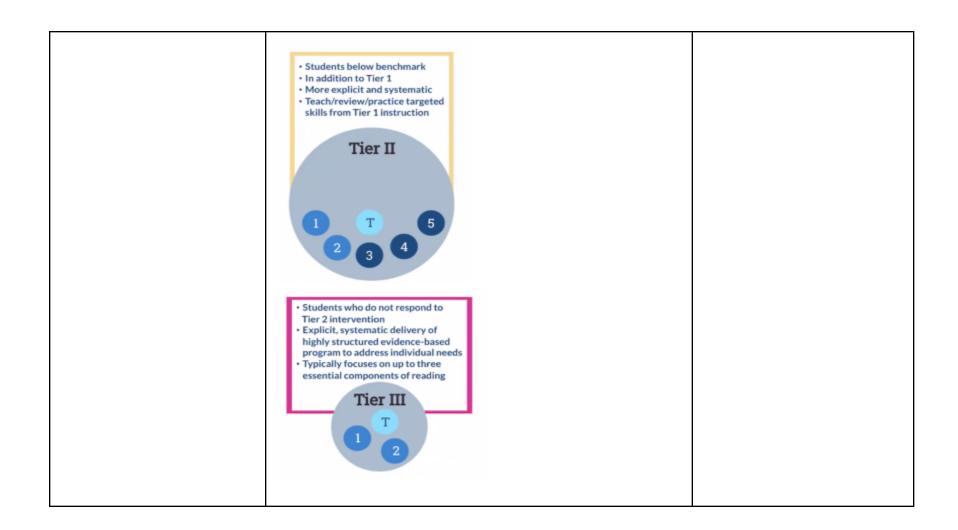

Intervention Fidelity Data

Intervention as designed:

- Dosage (time): 5x week for 30 minutes
- Pacing- neither too slow or too fast; perky
- Intervention Quality
 — checking for fidelity through observation/monitoring
 - A good check is to see if the intervention teacher is following the script.

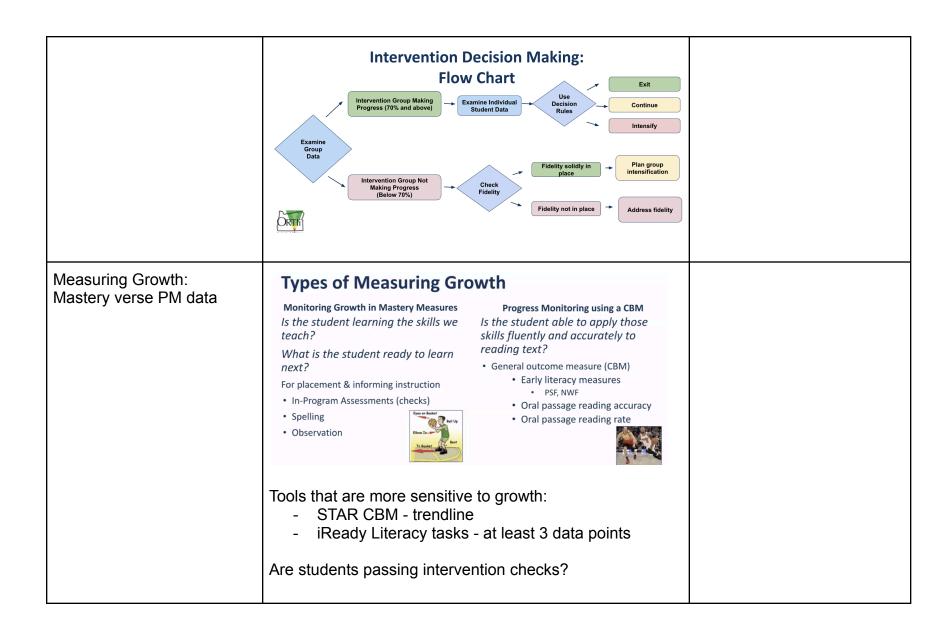
Recommendations: Checking for Fidelity

- Conducted by someone knowledgeable about explicit and systematic instruction such as:
 - literacy specialist/coach
 - o special education teacher/school psychologist
 - principal
 - other
- Can be brief (10-15 minutes)
- . Ideally conducted within the first two weeks of starting the intervention
- · Use a tool for consistency
 - o intervention script
 - o general explicit & systematic instruction checklist
 - o opportunities to respond (OTRs) (9-12 per minute)

Intervention checklists will be helpful in determining fidelity.

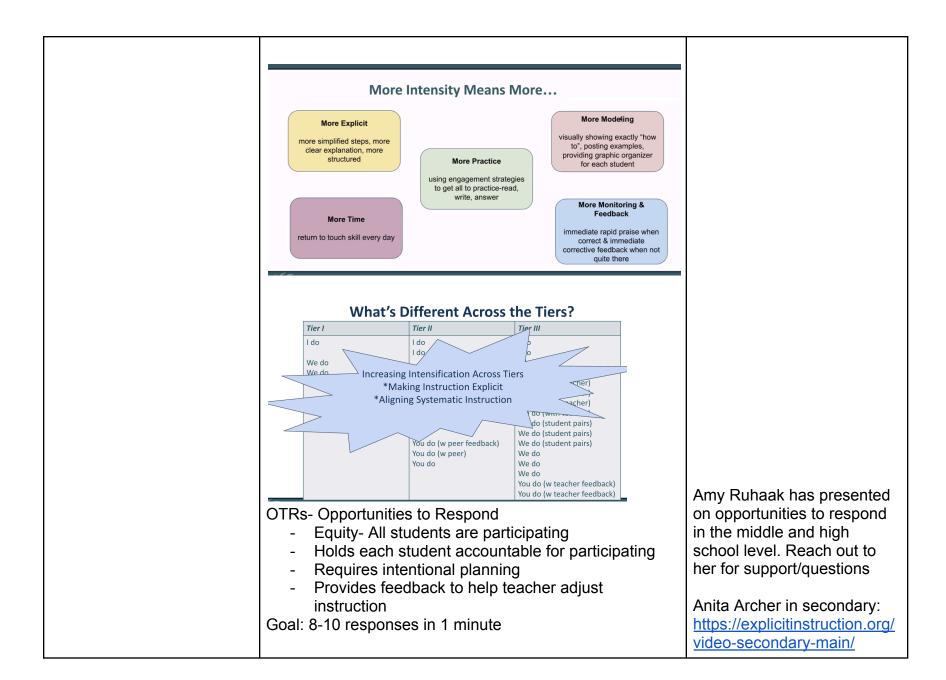

Special Education considerations (slides 65-81)

Content, methodology, and delivery

All students are general education students

Special education students should still participate and be progress monitored in all tiers of support

Students with Special Education Services

- Students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) still "Belong in the Pyramid"
- Students with IEPS should have access to Tier 1 Core Instruction
- Students with IEPs still receive all levels of instruction and support as needed (Tier 1, Tier 2, Tier 3). This includes being part of progress monitoring and interventions as appropriate.
- Students are provided with Specially Designed Instruction to master their goals and objectives.



When using EAs for interventions using programs, they need to be trained and receive ongoing coaching too

Considerations for MLs:

Are our students with IEPs and our multilingual learners making equitably adequate progress?

- · Students with IEPs for reading may need multiple years of support but the goal remains proficient reading.
- If multilingual learners are not making adequate progress with Tier 1 & 2 support, dig into whether or not interventions provide enough language support.
 - · PLUSS framework (explained in the notes)
 - Coordination of ELD support across tiers
 - · Growth compared to like-peers (more about this next year or talk to your coach)

Action Planning	 Tips for Creating an Action Plan Make connections with school academic plans. Goals are specific, measurable, attainable, relevant and timebound. Disaggregated data are reviewed to identify and address needs of student groups. Action steps are clearly articulated and described in sufficient detail. The plan includes professional learning for staff. Roles and responsibilities are clearly assigned to individuals or teams. Plan is communicated on a regular basis to all stakeholders. Determine what needs to be de-implemented (if needed). 	See slide 52-54 for a sample action plan ideas

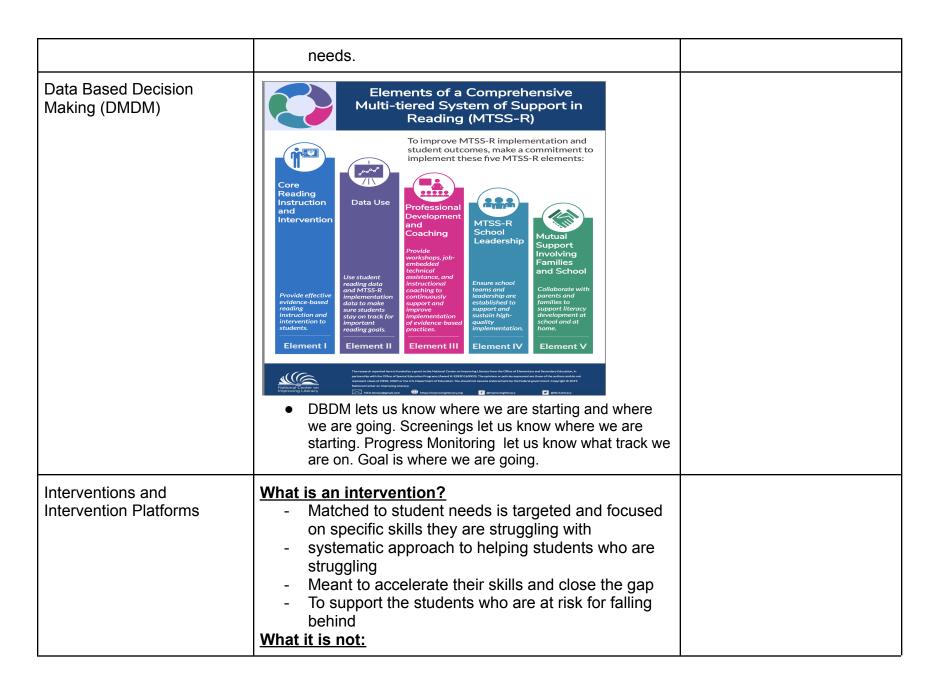

The Evidence is Clear and Compelling Reading trajectories are *established early* in a students' academic career and are stable across time Without early intervention, struggling readers do not "catch up" to their average performing peer. What are intervention programs:

- Schedules, organizes and integrates content over time
- Selects examples for you
- Breaks down skills so that you can more easily model and demonstrate them
- Provides language for providing clear explanations to reduce confusion
- Provides all learning materials
- Aligned to students' needs
- Provides consistency across teachers and grade-levels
- Have evidence of effectiveness

Data-Based Decision Making: Selecting Interventions	 Allows for focus on teaching content, not designing it Allows for focus on how students are responding, so you can correct, expand, elaborate Maintain a fast appropriate pace-to maximize engaged learning time Save planning time for data-based decision making (and individualization), rather than lesson development Interventions should supplement and not supplant core instruction (core + more=intervention) There is not a separate list of 'Tier 2' and 'Tier 3' intervention programs. ADMINISTERING THE RTFI

USE THE R-TFI Scoring Guide to Come to a Consensus on each team's final score.

The process is a "simultaneous and public voting process".

- Someone reads the item and the scoring guide.
- Team members think about how they want to score the item.
- When the team is ready to vote, publicly display your score (0,1, 2 on your fingers).
- People have a chance to provide a brief rationale for how they scored for the purpose of the team coming to a consensus.

Consensus does not require 100% agreement (will of the majority is supported by everyone) . The rich conversation is very valuable.

*Be honest and figure out what your school has and what needs to be strengthened so you can plan forward and determine your school's needs

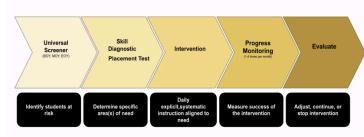

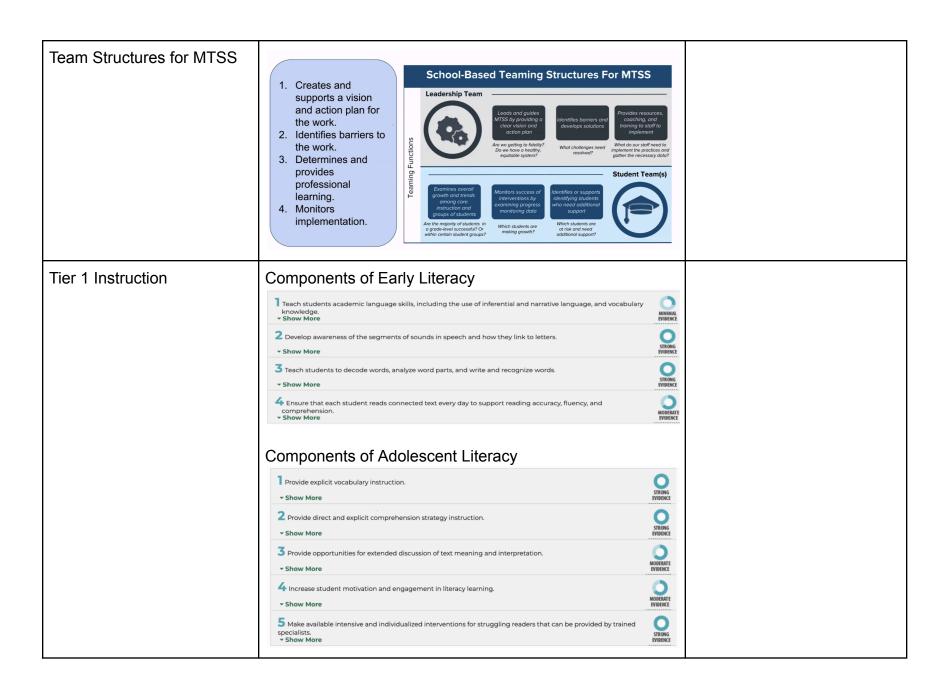

RTF-I definition of Tier 1 Universal Tier 1_ (see page 4) Universal Tier 1 reading instruction should benefit all learners, including students with disabilities. It integrates listening, speaking, reading, and writing and emphasizes the structure of language. Class-wide reading instruction includes lessons in phonology (speech-sound system), sound/symbol associations, orthography (writing structure), syntax (structure of sentences), morphology (meaningful parts in words), and semantics (meaning of words, phrases, sentences in text). Mechanisms are in place to support teachers as they prioritize curriculum resources to teach the structure of language using a combination of whole-group and small-group instruction. Sufficient time is also dedicated to teaching learners to be skillful readers across disciplines. Tier 1 instruction includes ongoing use of assessment data to inform instruction and to help identify learners who may need additional reading intervention supports. In order for Tier 1 instruction to serve all students, it must also align to Tier 2 and 3 reading intervention. There should be ample opportunities for practice within explicitly instruction time, as well as throughout the ELA block.
