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On February 9, 2021, Governor DeWine asked schools and districts to work with their communities and educational stakeholders to help students continue to advance academically and to make up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic and related disruptions.

“This once-in-a-lifetime pandemic has impacted all of us, so it should be no surprise that it has impacted our children. But we should not panic, nor should we be surprised by the results of assessments,” said Governor DeWine. “Instead, we should do what Ohioans have always done when facing a challenge – stay calm, roll up our sleeves, and work to solve the problem.”

Governor DeWine has requested that schools and districts design plans that address learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include, but are not limited to, extending the current school year, beginning the new year early, extending the school day or instituting summer programs, tutoring, remote options, and other remedial or supplemental activities.

Plans should address, but are not limited to, the following key components:

- **Impacted Students:** How will schools and districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations)?
- **Needs Assessment:** How will schools and districts identify the needs of those students?
- **Resources and Budget:** What resources are available to address those needs? Generally, what is the budget for the plan?
- **Approaches:** What approaches can best be deployed to address those needs? (This may include approaches such as ending the school year later than scheduled, beginning the new year early, extending the school day, summer programs, tutoring, and remote options.)
- **Partnerships:** Which local and regional partners (such as Educational Service Centers, Information Technology Centers, libraries, museums, after-school programs, or civic organizations) can schools and districts engage in supporting student needs?
- **Alignment:** How can this plan reinforce and align to other district or school plans? This may include but is not limited to Student Wellness and Success Fund plans, remote learning plans, improvement plans, CCIP-related plans, graduation plans.

Each district or school should consider its unique needs and issues and prepare its plan in a way that responds appropriately and leverages the assets of its unique partners including their Educational Service Center and other regional and community-based partners. Each district or school should consider a wide range of representation and voices from district and community stakeholders in planning for learning recovery and extended learning opportunities.

The governor asked schools and districts to provide their plans to the public and General Assembly no later than April 1.

Spring 2021	Through the use of STAR, Edmentum diagnostics, Kindergarten Readiness Assessment, F&P Benchmarking, and Heggerty. For higher grade levels, in addition to classroom assessments and overall performance in classes, SLSD uses historical Ohio State Assessment data (item analysis) to identify students who should be targeted for extended learning time through access to support in Math and ELA. Summer 2021*	In addition to those items listed above, we will utilize state testing data available late June to further determine which students were most successful or struggled. We also have historical trend data that outlines the mastery level of standards in traditional school years. Possible opportunity for enrichment can occur based on student interest. Spring 2021*	<p>STAR provides data on expected and stretch growth targets for grades K-3. Data collected is used to inform instruction for those students. The program provides “next steps” recommendations and lessons customized to the group (i.e. phonics, vocabulary, fractions, etc.) In addition, these students are instructed on individual levels to differentiate for each student.</p> <p>Regardless of group, gap filling will be based on either individual standards or clusters of standards. Those most critical to future learning will be prioritized.</p>	
Summer 2021*	<p>The summer extended learning plan is available to all students who wish to participate, if applicable. The proposed plan is that students will be supported through the use of the ExactPath learning software. . The proposed K-12 plan is for three weeks of 1 hour daily (remotely) for students to sign into the ExactPath program to meet individual needs in the areas of ELA and math. A teacher, or teachers if necessary, will be assigned duties to check in with students to ensure progress. If needed, office hour times will be assigned for additional help.</p> <p>Additionally, for students grades 9-12, our focus would be on students with either credit deficiency and credit recovery with courses delivered primarily online. In addition, students anticipated to not perform at a proficient level on the Algebra I, Geometry, and/or ELA II state assessments based on data or recommendation, will receive targeted intervention in preparation for a potential summer re-testing opportunity. This would also take place remotely with an in-person area provided, if needed.</p>
