## **Short Story Unit: Goals and Expectations for the Student**

<u>Overview:</u> This document will outline what is to be expected of the student, grading percentages, mandatory assignments and basic levels of understanding. Students are expected to attend class every day, complete both written and computer-based homework assignments, as well as read independently outside of class. A portfolio will be required and the checklist will be provided at a later date.

<u>Grading:</u> The fourth quarter grade will be determined by performance in the following areas. Quarter 4 is broken-down into categories on the left and Standard-based criteria are on the right.

Assignment Categories	Grade reports will look like this
Formative Assessments- 20%	(A) Exceeds Proficiency- maximum grade of 100%

#### Students will be expected to:

- Maintain a 5 section binder (Do Now, Classwork, Homework, Short Story Assignments and Quiz/Test).
- Read three assigned books independently outside of class-time, and complete the attached activities.
- Work both in groups and independently on various in-class and homework activities...
- Enhance knowledge of the Parts of Speech and Sentence structure through writing and revision..
- Complete weekly supplemental vocabulary enrichment activities @ vocabtest.com.
- Complete each 'Short Story Activity" as it is assigned.
- Participate in 'Do Now' journal entries at least two days for each regular week.
- Complete at least <u>two</u> drafts of a Short Story. The short story must contain the elements listed in class: conflict, plot, setting, characters, characterization, theme/moral, snapshot and thoughtshot. Students will also be expected to understand, identify and use the following terms effectively: internal and external conflict, protagonist, antagonist, direct and indirect characterization, stated and implied theme and inference.
- Positively participate in all homework and classwork activities
- Create a portfolio that includes assignments created during the guarter.

### Goals:

- The student will understand and be able to explain the elements of a short story.
- The student will demonstrate mastery of the writing process through the creation of a short story.
- The student will be able to make connections to and determine relevance of both fiction and non-fiction to real life.
- The student will expand their use of vocabulary through the learning of word roots and college level vocabulary.
- The student will gain insight about him/herself by making a connection with a character from a book of his/her own choosing.

# Short Story: Important Dates for the Student

Overview: Writing stories is very different from writing the research paper. Not everyone starts at the same spot. Some will start with a character. Others will begin with a setting or a detail. Still others will begin with a theme or an idea. Wherever you choose to begin, there are certain activities that will be required for this activity. These activities are required because, whatever order you choose, they will enhance your final written story. Just so we are clear: ALL OF THE STEPS ARE REQUIRED. Once you begin writing the short story, two drafts are required; but, feel free to write as many as you like until it is what you want. Remember: it must have all of the elements listed in class: internal and external conflict, plot, setting, protagonist and antagonist, direct and indirect characterization, implied and stated theme and thoughtshot. A snapshot is recommended, but many of your stories might be one big snapshot!
