**Patrick van Kessel** is a senior data scientist at Pew Research Center, specializing in computational social science research and methodology. He is the author of studies that have used natural language processing and machine learning to measure negative political discourse and news sharing behavior by members of Congress on social media, and is involved in the ongoing development of best practices for the application of data science methods across the Center.

**Laura Puls** is the Research Librarian at the National Center for Victims of Crime. She contributes to the Center for Victim Research by managing the CVR Library collection, responding to reference questions, and leading trainings on library search methods. Previously, Laura worked at the Council on Foreign Relations Library leading trainings on database research, online search, and organizational tools.



**Dr. Jeffrey L. Sedgwick** is currently Executive Director of the Justice Research and Statistics Association (JRSA), a national association of criminal justice statistical analysts and researchers in Washington, DC. He served as Assistant Attorney General – Office of Justice Programs during 2008 and director of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) from 2006 to 2008. He is professor emeritus of political science at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, where he began working in 1978, specializing in aspects of American

government including public finance, criminal justice policy, and the role of the American presidency. He has a bachelor's degree in political science from Kenyon College, a master's degree in public administration and public policy from the University of Virginia, and a Ph.D. in government and public affairs, also from UVA.



### Migration Policy Institute

**Jeanne Batalova** is a Senior Policy Analyst and Demographer at the Migration Policy Institute. Her areas of expertise include the impacts of immigrants on society and labor markets; social and economic mobility of first- and second-generation youth and young adults; and the policies and practices regulating immigration and integration of immigrant professionals and foreign students in the United States and other countries. She is also Manager of the MPI Data Hub, a one-stop, web-based resource that provides instant

access to the latest facts, stats, and maps covering U.S. and global data on immigration and immigrant integration.

Open Academic Writing: An Atom Based Workflow **Dr. Juan Carlos Castillo** received his Doctorate in Sociology from the University of Humboldt, Berlin. He is currently the deputy director of the Center for Conflict Studies and Social Cohesion (COES) and director of the Study Group of Sociology and Information Sciences of CONICYT. His research focuses on the link between the subjective and objective dimensions of economic inequality, as well as political attitudes and civic education. His work has been published in journals such as

Social Justice Research, Social Science Research, and Social Psychology Quarterly.



Annotation for Transparent Inquiry (ATI): Transparency in Practice in Qualitative Research

**Sebastian Karcher** is the Associate Director of the Qualitative Data Repository at Syracuse University. His main research interests are in qualitative data management, curation, and the integration of data tools into scholarly workflows. He is an active contributor to several scholarly open source projects, including Zotero and the Citation Style Language, as well as a founding editor of the emerging Author Carpentry series of lessons. He holds a PhD in political science from Northwestern University. Sebastian has published in both social

science journals such as International Science Quarterly and Socio-Economic Review and information science journals such as IFLA Journal and Data Science Journal.



**Diana Kapiszewski** is received her PhD in political science from UC Berkeley in 2007. Her research interests include public law, comparative politics, and research methods. Her first book, High Courts and Economic Governance in Argentina and Brazil

(Cambridge University Press, 2012), which received the APSA Law and Courts Section's C. Herman Pritchett Award, explores high court-elected branch interactions over economic policy in Argentina and Brazil in the post-transition period. Her current work examines judicial politics and the uses of law in Latin America. One project analyzes institutions of electoral governance and another investigates informal workers€™ use of legal strategies in the region; each focuses specifically on Brazil and Mexico.

**Kyle Siler** is a Researcher at the Copernicus Institute of Sustainable Development at Utrecht University. His previous research on peer review has been published in *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, Social Studies of Science* and *Science, Technology and Human*

**April Hathcock** is the Scholarly Communications Librarian at NYU where she educates the campus community on issues of ownership, access, and rights in the research lifecycle. She received her J.D. and LL.M. in International and Comparative Law from Duke University School of Law and her M.L.I.S. from the University of South Florida. Before entering librarianship, she practiced intellectual property and antitrust law for a global private firm. Her research interests include diversity and inclusion in librarianship, cultural creation and

exchange, and the ways in which social and legal infrastructures benefit the works of certain groups over others. She is a 2018 *Library Journal Mover and Shaker*, as well as the author of the article "White Librarianship in Blackface: Diversity Initiatives in LIS" and the blog *At the Intersection*, which examines issues at the intersection of feminism, libraries, social justice, and the law.

Prior to joining ARL, Krista worked as the staff attorney for Knowledge Ecology International, an organization dedicated to searching for better outcomes, including new solutions, to the management of knowledge resources, particularly in the context of social justice.

Krista received her JD from the University of Notre Dame and her BA in English from the University of California, Santa Barbara. She is licensed to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States, the Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit, and the State Bar of California.

**Dr. Jeff Spies** is the co-founder and Chief Technology Officer (CTO) of the Center for Open Science (COS), a non-profit technology company missioned to increase openness, integrity, and reproducibility of scholarly research. As CTO, he is responsible for technical strategy, product vision, software architecture, external partner/funder development, and management of COS Labs—COS's research and development team. Dr. Spies also co-leads SHARE—an initiative by the Association of Research Libraries and COS to create a free, open dataset of research activity

across the research life-cycle. He has a Ph.D. in Quantitative Psychology (read: Behavioral Statistics) from the University of Virginia, where he now holds a Visiting Assistant Professor position in the Department of Engineering and Society. His dissertation included the development of the Open Science Framework—a free, open source workflow management system and scholarly commons that is now the flagship product of COS.

**Dr. Arthur Lupia** is the head of the Directorate for Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences (SBE), which supports fundamental research in behavioral, cognitive, social and economic sciences. Lupia has more than 25 years of leadership and management experience in the social sciences community. Since 2006, he has served as the Hal R. Varian Collegiate Professor of Political Science at the University of Michigan. He also is the former chairman of the board for the Center for Open Science, and chair of the National Academies Roundtable on the

Communication and Use of Social and Behavioral Sciences. Lupia has also held leadership positions in numerous professional societies.

<u>SocArXiv</u>, open archive of the social sciences, is a partner of the nonprofit Center for Open Science (COS) and is housed at the University of Maryland. SocArXiv provides a free and publicly accessible platform for social scientists to upload working papers, pre-prints, published papers, data, and code. SocArXiv is dedicated to opening up social science, to reach more people more effectively, to improve research, and build the future of scholarly communication. Since the development of SocArXiv was first announced in July 2016, researchers have deposited more than 1,400 papers.
