They will also practice addressing and rebutting counterarguments, using persuasive language and techniques, and organizing their essays effectively with a strong introduction, body, and conclusion. By the end of the unit, students will be able to write persuasive essays that present and defend their viewpoints while engaging with opposing perspectives.	In informative writing students will learn how to clearly convey facts and information to educate their audience. They will develop skills in researching, organizing data logically, and presenting information in a structured format with an introduction, body, and conclusion. Additionally, students will gain an understanding of how to select credible sources, integrate evidence, and maintain an objective tone. By the end of the unit, they will be able to write well-structured informative pieces on a variety of topics, focusing on clarity, accuracy, and coherence.
